

Legion Abandons Civic Auditorium As Meeting Place

Their appeal for consideration granted veterans in other communities denied by the City Council, Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170, the American Legion will abandon the Civic auditorium as a meeting place in favor of the United Steelworkers of America, C.I.O., hall on Border ave.

It was announced the first meeting of the Legion in the C.I.O. hall will be on Thursday, April 3, at 8 p.m., and that meetings will be held there on the first and third Thursdays of each month.

Requests that the Civic auditorium use be granted free to veterans groups as a "Veterans hall," such as provided in most California cities in memory of men who have given their life for their country, were given a blunt "no" by the City Council recently.

The American Legion post complained that the scale of city charges, which runs as high as 70 cents per head per night for dinners, is too high for the veterans group.

It has been noted that since the rates, calling for \$35 for the hall, \$10 for the public address system, \$5 for the spotlight and \$15 for use of the kitchen, each night, the use of the auditorium by "paying" customers has dropped nearly 90 percent. This defeats the revenue-seeking aim of the Council in setting up the rate, it is pointed out.

It was said that the interpretation placed by the court on the Los Angeles Police union can be applied to all unions comprised of government workers, whether city, state or federal.

The local city employees union has been in existence for many years, frequently appearing before the City Council and Civil Service Board on grievances, wage and promotional questions.

It was pointed out that Torrance requirements work a hardship on operators, and it was agreed they will be reduced to compare with surrounding communities.

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
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
