quarters, and to the rear of the Chamber quarters be covered for the equipment.

Despite the fact that the city has been operating under a sales tax for four months and has been paid much of its ad valorem tax funds for the first half of the fiscal year, some city officials were seen to be shaking their heads as to how to finance such a temporary improvement.

A finance report, on condition of the city's funds from regular tax sources and the sales tax has been asked of the city officials from time to time but has not been forthcoming.

It was requested to give the people an idea as exactly how the city of Torrance stands at this time, financially.

Likewise, the adoption of a city budget for the present fiscal year has not yet been announced.

No matter what the condition of the city's finances is at this time, it was pointed out, the Fire department cannot occupy the quarters of the old station until the building is placed in condition acceptable to the insurance companies and building officials.

The kitchen of the auditorium would be used for cooking by the fire department and sleeping quarters would be provided in the rear of the Chamber of Commerce building, under proposals of the city officials. The equipment would remain in the open, except for a roof and temporary walls to protect it from the elements.

Ask To Construct Vet Memorial In Walteria Area

In a letter to the City Council Tuesday night, B. J. Michels, representing youth groups in Walteria, stated that the people of Walteria wish to construct a living memorial to the veterans of Walteria in the form of a recreation building for use by the various youth and community groups of the area, the money to be raised by public subscription.

They wished, it was stated, to use two lots owned by the city on Park st. between 240th and 242nd sts. If the city was not willing to furnish the lots, it was desired to build the memorial on the grounds of the present Walteria Recreation Park. The building upon completion would be turned over to the city recreation department, it was said.

The council agreed to meet a committee Monday evening at 7 o'clock to discuss the matter.

Airline Chair Need Outlined By Local Man

Studies of applied anatomy, physiology and kinesiology were recommended to aeronautical engineers here today as helpful in solving one of mankind's oldest problems, seating comfort, currently aggravated and complicated by airlines operations.

Charles W. Morris, of Doak Aircraft Co., told the National Aeronautic meeting of the Society of Automotive Engineers in Hotel New Yorker, New York City, that something bordering upon the drastic must be done to make airliner chairs more comfortable for passengers varying in size, shape, and disposition. As airline speeds increase, flights lengthen, and sleep per planes are less frequently used, Morris added, passengers grow dissatisfied with "two-hour comfort."

The ideal airliner chair was characterized as one which provides equal comfort for tall and short passengers, permits relaxation and even slumber without annoying armrests, and counteracts the present embarrassing tendency of skirts and shirtings to "hike up." He proposed the use of adjustable chairs having seat heights approximately 17 inches, widths of 20 inches, and backs approximately 20 inches with a concave front edge to accommodate both short and long legs, and arm rests which can be set for comfortable heights.

"We are seeking," he reported, "the advantages offered by the reclining-back Morris chair of past days and the time-tried rocking chair without including the disadvantages."

Salary Hikes For Justices Of Peace Allowed

Increases in salaries for Justices of the Peace were approved by the Board of Supervisors at its Tuesday meeting, according to Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, chairman of the board.

The final recommendation which was approved gives a salary raise of \$100 per month for Gardena-Inglewood Justices of the Peace, which brings the monthly salary up to \$550. The salary increase for Beverly Hills is \$125 per month, bringing the total monthly salary to \$625, and Compton Justice of the Peace will hereafter receive a raise of \$125 per month, which will bring the salary up to \$625. The Justice of the Peace in Avalon received an increase from \$75 to \$175 per month during the war years, so that his present salary was not affected by the new schedules. The Malibu Justice of the Peace will receive \$300 per month. Darby stated that the revised schedules were based on the heavier work load now being handled by the different townships. The new schedules will bring the top salary of Justices of the Peace of class "A" courts to \$7,500 per year.


