

Go-And-Return Air Trips To Coastal Cities

Schedule changes effective April first that will enable businessmen of metropolitan Los Angeles to make convenient one-day, go-and-return trips by air to any of six coastal cities north of here, were announced today by Southwest Airways.

Actual "commuter" service by air becomes a reality with the new schedules, it was pointed out by Michael E. Cole, general traffic manager of the West's new government-authorized feeder airline.

Departure from Los Angeles Municipal Airport is at 9:00 a.m. daily, Cole declared, and the return flight from intermediate cities along Southwest's route up the coast arrives here at 6:22 p. m. This allows businessmen a minimum of five hours in Oxnard, Ventura, Santa Barbara, Santa Maria, San Luis Obispo or Coalinga.

Lane entered the naval service March 1, 1946, and received his recruit training at the Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.


