1947 veteran dates to remember.

May 12. Monday, May 12, has been designated by the American hospital association as Hospital Day throughout the United States and Canada.

The theme selected this year by the AHA is, "Visit a veteran in a hospital, and remember him every day." The Veterans Administration hospitals in this area will hold open house on this date and an urgent invitation is extended to the public to visit the veterans in these institutions and to see just what is being done for them.

There are more than 8,000 veterans in three hospitals in the Los Angeles VA regional area. Special programs are being arranged.

The war has not ended for these veterans. For many of them it will never end. "Visit them in a hospital on Hospital Day. Remember them every day."

June 30. Amputee veterans of World War II in order to obtain one of the free automobiles granted them by the Government must have their eligibility certified by June 30.

Congress appropriated \$30,000,000 to pay for the cars and the law provides that the unused portion of this fund be cancelled June 30, 1947. Delivery may be made after June 30 for those certified to be eligible before that date. Encumbrances will be placed against the appropriation for all duly certified before the deadline and these encumbrances will not be cancelled out with the unused part of the appropriation.

Throughout the United States 19,426 World War II veterans who have lost one or both legs, or the use of one or both legs, have applied for cars. In the Los Angeles VA regional area 622 have filed applications, 514 sales agreements have been signed, and 422 cars have been delivered.

Jan 30, 1947. Veterans of all wars who wish to take advantage of the California veterans' tax exemption benefits must file for this exemption with their county tax assessors not later than Monday, June 30. Applications for exemptions must be filed each year between the first Monday of March and the last Monday of June. Assessors ask to see evidence of service and a complete legal description of property.

August 1, 1947. Midnight, Aug. 1, is the deadline set by General Bradley for reinstatement of National Service Life Insurance policies upon a comparative health statement.

Thousands of veterans in the Los Angeles VA area who have allowed their policies to lapse may be unable to obtain insurance of any kind after this date because of disease or disabilities they have incurred.

Until August 1, all veterans may reinstate lapsed policies, regardless of the period of lapse, upon payment of two monthly premiums (if term policies) and by signing a statement that they are in as good health now as they were at time of lapse.

Permits Issued For 24 New Homes Nearby

A record week showed building permits issued for 16 homes in the Shoestring strip and eight in Harbor City included in more than one-quarter million dollars worth of permits issued.

The total included a \$77,600 application of Torrance Contractor Howard R. Bowers for 12 homes and garages in the Shoestring strip at \$6,400 per unit.

Of the non-housing permits issued, tops was the application of the Long Beach Lumber Dealers Supply Co. to erect a \$30,000 sash and door mill at 25914 President ave., Harbor City.

The 12 Shoestring homes planned by Bowers will be erected at 1332, 1318, 1424, 1428, and 1343 W. 22nd st.; 1348 W. 219th st.; and 22232, 22226, 22210, 22214, 22220, and 22120 S. Denker st.
