Air Parks located in the heart of crowded areas will never go over with the common herd because they don't serve enough of the surrounding population.

Viewing clearly established trends in automobile and airplane travel, it is amazing how difficult everybody is making this elementary problem.

The fine roads that built up the automobile industry have long been the responsibility of the County, State and Federal Government. So should it be with airports for airplanes. County, State and Federal taxes on gasoline, together with license fees, provided good roads.

The airplane is useless without a car to drive people to and from their destinations. In most instances good roads follow the shortest, safest and most practical routes. Why not plan now to combine the facilities for both by building super-highways of the dual type with landing areas and runways every ten miles or so.

These strips can be maintained inexpensively at no expense to the overtaxed communities. They will never be subjected to the growing antipathy of the general public such as now exists on close-in, private airports located in congested areas. Neither will they present fire hazards, property damage or personal injury in the event of mechanical failures or reckless flying.

If those waving a red flag about the mistakes we have made in our road planning projects will take heed now, airports of the future will be assured at very little additional expense to building super-highways and our small communities will be spared the expense and worry.
