

Softball First Round Nears End; Pappas Hurls No-Hitter, Loses!

The first round of the Torrance Industrial softball league nears completion this week with only 13 games left to play. Interest remains high in the local tournament, with increasing large crowds turning out for every night's double header at the local park.

Last Wednesday night the National Supply diamonders made a snappy comeback from their defeat at the hands of the Moose in their last game, by trouncing the Bears by a score of 7-4. Nick Pappas hurled for the winners, whiffing 11, allowing five hits and passing four.

The night-cap saw two undefeated teams clash, with the Dixie soap-sudders foaming to the top with a 3-0 victory over the Moose club. Van West hurled another masterpiece, holding the Moose-men to two hits, for his fourth win of the tournament.

In Thursday night's double feature, Ken's club took the Ravens into camp in a scoring spree ending with a final score of 17-11. Joe Kalina hurled for the victors.

Shell also ran into big figures in defeating Goodyear 12-2, in the second game of the evening. Goodyear donated five bobbles to the Shell cause.

Friday night's opener saw the Columbia Stealers upset the Moose club, coming out on the long end of a 14-8 score, scoring all but one of their markers in a big third inning. Art Cellos hurled for the winners.

Another big scoring fracas

marked the second game with the Dow lads handing the Nationals their second loss by a score of 12-10. Hal Jones starred for the winners, getting five hits including a three-bagger in five trips to the plate. The victory marked the fifth win for Dow with one loss.

In the National-Goodyear game Monday evening, Nick Pappas, National hurler, accomplished the very rare feat of pitching a no-hit ball game and losing it, the Goodyear team coming out on top of a 2-0 score.

The rubber-men got both of their tallies in the third off two walks, two passed balls, and an error by the second baseman. Nary another man reached base for the Goodyear boys, but those two runs were all that were needed, as Fred Fredensberg held the Nationals to three scattered hits, striking out nine.

In the second game, the Dixie lads brought their win streak to five, holding on to first place in the first round; defeating Ken's by a score of 6-2. Van West turning in his usual fine performance on the hill for the victors.

In Tuesday's first game the Torrance Moose behind the hurdling of John Trainotti and Dick Bowman, defeated the Ravens by a 10-6 score. Trainotti fanned only nine men in his three innings on the mound. Dude Olsen went the route for the Ravens and was nipped for nine singles including Dick Hall's second inning home-run. The Ravens got six hits off Bowman.

Dick Leech pitched the Columbia Steel to a 2-1 victory over the Bears in the second game. Jack Kirkled, of the losers allowed but two hits, but walks coupled with an infield out produced the two runs that stood up for the Stealers.

Tonight's games match Dow and Columbia in the opener and Moose and Goodyear in the night-cap. Tomorrow, National takes on Ken's, while the Ravens and Bears tangle in the night finale.

Harbor City Delegates Attend Playground Meet

Harbor City definitely will receive a new playground if Proposition "B," a recreation bond issue, is passed by the Los Angeles city electorate on May 27. Ralph Borrelli, district director of the Department of Playground and Recreation is reported to have said Friday.

Borrelli spoke in Griffith Park at a dinner meeting attended by Harbor City representatives, Mrs. G. A. Bockker, Mrs. Alta Collins and C. F. King.

The playground for Harbor City has been mentioned as one of 43 new city recreation areas to be paid for by the projected issue of \$12,078,000 in 49-year serial bonds. Thirty new playgrounds, 13 centers, and 10 swimming pools are in the plans.

The contemplated recreation program also includes the building of new children's camps to provide summer and week end out-of-doors recreation.

It has been endorsed by the 10th District Parent-Teacher organization and many other parent and child welfare groups.

Negrete Faces Gene Martin At Wilmington

Freddie Negrete of Wilmington, one of the most promising little lightweight fighting machines in the far west today, and Gene Martin of Pasadena, clash in the main event of the amateur boxing show at the Wilmington Bowl tomorrow night.

The 135-pound "natural," which brings together the boys for the third time this season, will share the spotlight on Joe Craig's weekly boxing show with an inter-stable battle between the Harbor A. C. and Santa Roberto's strong Pasadena A.C. club. Inter-stable boxing has proven most popular with the fight fans at the Bowl in recent months, and another near-capacity crowd is virtually assured.

Negrete and Martin have broken even in two previous battles, each taking hairline decisions after four of the fastest rounds of action.

The first preliminary will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Remaining trout fishing havens in Southern California, which did not start their season April 5, opened to anglers Thursday.

Arrowhead, Big Bear, Gregory, Crystal and Irving lakes, as well as the Santa Ynez, Santa Clara and Ventura rivers and the Sespe and Matilija creeks are scheduled to open.

Trouth season will be opened throughout the state except on the west slope of the Sierra Madre mountains and in the following northern counties: Tuolumne, Calaveras, Mariposa, Alpine, Amador, El Dorado, Nevada, Placer, Fresno, Madera, Tulare and Kern. In these areas, including Yosemite, Sequoia, Kings Canyon and some sections of Lassen National Park, fishing will not be permitted until May 30.

SUMMER SEASON QUARANTINE FOR MUSSELS ISSUED

The California State Division of Fish and Game has announced that it has received a mussel quarantine order from the State Department of Public Health, on all mussels from the California-Oregon boundary south to the California-Mexico boundary, effective May 1 to October 31, 1947.

The Division wishes to caution all sportsmen and recreationists to use mussels during this period for bait purposes only.

Gardena Places Most In Marine Preliminaries

The Gardena high school track men came away with the highest number of qualifiers for Friday's Marine league finals in the preliminaries staged on the Narbonne cinder paths last Friday afternoon, placing 67. Narbonne and Banning were right behind with 55 each, while Torrance and San Pedro placed 42 each.

Highlight of the afternoon was the mark racked up by Banning's 1320 yard lover, Francisco Pacheco, who set a new Marine league mark as he galloped the course in 3:20.9. The previous record was held by Leroy Stecker of Torrance, who went the route in 3:22.5 in 1939. The city mark, still standing, was set at 3:17 in 1936 by Roosevelt's Tom Millan.
