

Sawtelle Scene Of Memorial Rites Friday

Completed plans for Memorial Day ceremonies to honor the 27,000 veterans interred in the West Los Angeles Veterans Administration cemetery were announced today by Robert A. Bringham, manager of the VA Center of which the cemetery is a part.

Dr. Hugh Tiner, president of George Pepperdine College, was selected as orator of the day by the committee composed of Veterans Administration and veterans' organization representatives.

Dinah Shore will sing a solo and lead the audience in singing "America." Pat O'Brien will deliver Lincoln's Gettysburg address.

Proceeding the program, a parade will form in Westwood and march from there to the cemetery. Pat Phillips, representing all veterans' organizations, is parade chairman. Manager Bringham will act as grand marshal for the twelfth consecutive year.

Richard Borland, commander of the 24th district of the American Legion was selected as chief of staff. The program to be held in the cemetery following the parade was arranged by Paul S. Cleland, director of special services for the VA Center. Boy Scouts of America will assist in traffic direction and grave decorations.

The Veterans Administration cemetery in West Los Angeles is the second largest government cemetery in the United States and each year many thousands of citizens attend the annual Memorial Day ceremonies.

A general invitation has been extended to all patriotic organizations, civic bodies and friends of the hospital, according to Mr. Bringham. No individual invitations will be issued. It is expected the ceremonies in the cemetery which follow the parade will open about 10:30 a. m.

"Get thee hence, Satan! for it is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve." This statement of Jesus from Matthew in the Golden Text of the Sunday Lesson-Sermon in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, "Ancient and Modern Necromancy, alias Mesmerism and Hypnotism, Denounced," is the subject.

Matthew's Gospel relates that there was brought unto Jesus "one possessed with a devil, blind, and dumb; and he healed him, insomuch that the blind and dumb both spake and saw. . . . But when the Pharisees heard it, they said, This fellow doth not cast out devils, but by Beelzebub the prince of the devils. And Jesus knew their thoughts, and said unto them, . . . If Satan cast out Satan, he is divided against himself; how shall then his kingdom stand? . . . But if I cast out devils by the Spirit of God, then the kingdom of God is come unto you."

In "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" Mary Baker Eddy writes, "The exterminator of error is the great truth that God, good, is the only Mind, and that the supposititious opposite of infinite Mind—called *evil* or *evil-ness*—is not Mind, is not Truth, but error, without intelligence or reality. . . . We can have but one Mind, if that one is infinite."

Cenotaph To Be Dedicated At Inglewood Park

Honoring Southland heroes who died in World War II, observance of Memorial Day at Inglewood Park cemetery will assume an added significance this year when the magnificent new white marble cenotaph, designed as an everlasting tribute to the war dead will be officially dedicated, according to an announcement by the committee in charge of the Memorial Day program.

Located at the Sanctuary of Hope, in Inglewood Park's Mausoleum, the cenotaph features three impressive bronze tablets. The central dedication tablet, recessed in the marble wall, displays in addition to the symbolic emblems of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, the insignia of the air forces of the three service branches.

On either side of the central plaque are memorial tablets upon which cast bronze name plates of those who died or are missing in the service may be installed.

With the ceremony starting at 9:30 a. m., Friday, and with Commander Carl M. Sittler, Ch.C. U.S.N., staff chaplain of Terminal Island Naval Base, delivering the dedicatory address, a formation of fighter planes and a bomber from the Naval Air Reserve at Alhambra will fly overhead and release a floral blanket, piece, the target of which will be the open area at the entrance of Inglewood Park Mausoleum.
