

Two Fined For Driving While Intoxicated

Two men pleaded guilty in Torrance City Court Friday to charges of driving while intoxicated and were fined \$100 each by City Judge John A. Shidler. They were: Arthur E. Myers, of Los Angeles, who was arrested June 8, and Thomas Norman Cottom, of 1033 W. 253rd st., Lomita, who was arrested June 12.

Judge Shidler stated in passing sentence that alcoholism is becoming a problem in the state of California as well as the nation and that a bill is now before the State Legislature which will make it mandatory to suspend a driver's license for a period of ninety days upon first conviction of drunk driving.

The law at present automatically suspends the license for thirty days upon conviction.

Double Move Of Two Bungalows May Be Needed

Whether or not Los Angeles City School district will comply with the request of Torrance City School district and return the bungalows moved from Torrance elementary school grounds to Perry school, where they are needed, or will insist on returning them to Torrance elementary remained a matter of conjecture Tuesday night.

When the Superior court ordered the bungalows moved back to Torrance, under decree entered in the suit brought by City Judge John A. Shidler and the Torrance Board of Education, local school officials asked that they be moved from their present Gardena elementary school location to Perry school, a much shorter distance than Torrance elementary and a place where they will be required for additional enrollment next year.

Los Angeles school people are planning to move the units back to Torrance elementary, however, and the extra move to Perry may have to be made at the expense of Torrance taxpayers.

"It will remove a blight which exists at the site now." He said that the project is well planned, the modern design calling for a slight pitched and white roof. The planning all was taken care of by experienced landscapers.

There will be an unexposed garage for each apartment. Play space will be provided in the court of the project.

There will be a central garbage collection depot, off the street within the court. There will be ample laundry facilities.

"With all these features 'off the street' I would like to have any opponent point out one objectionable feature," Parkin said. "This is real progress. This is 'money in the pockets' of every family in Torrance. This is keeping payrolls at home. We want more of these projects."

John E. McGovern, district director of the Federal Housing Administration, in a letter to City Clerk A. H. Bartlett endorsing the Pine project, said that all objectionable features such as garages, playgrounds, garbage collection and others are completely concealed from the street. "The buildings are arranged in groups to create the largest possible amount of space and landscaped areas visible from the street. Considerable thought has been given to the exterior architectural treatment by a very well regarded architect . . . so as to avoid any monotonous repetition and to tie in this development architecturally with the surrounding neighborhood. The various buildings units have been separated and divided into groups so as to avoid the appearance of being a large project. The rear entrances have been concealed from street view."

The planning commission hearing on July 1 will be on petitions for a change of zone and vacation of necessary streets, it was said.

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
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
