

**Junior Colleges Found Popular With Veterans**

California's junior colleges, by adapting themselves to the special needs of the group, have measured up to the requirements of the veterans attending them. This is the finding of Dr. James S. Hughes in his dissertation presented as part of his study for a degree of Doctor of Education on the Berkeley campus of the University of California. To discover how successful the junior colleges had been in meeting the needs of the veterans, Dr. Hughes compiled the results of questionnaires filled out by 1,800 such students at 10 public junior colleges. The results showed the great majority of the veterans satisfied with the efficiency of educational service they were receiving. In addition to their satisfaction with the general curriculum, Dr. Hughes found that most veterans believe that the guidance programs developed by the junior colleges are adequate and efficient.

**Rolling Hills Takes Steps For Fire District**

Action which may lead to establishment of a fire district in Rolling Hills area has been taken by the Rolling Hills Association. A fire commission has been appointed whose initial responsibility is to make studies, prepare reports, and submit their recommendations on the fire prevention situation in Rolling Hills. The committee, composed of Fred Banta, fire chief, Carl Allen, Cy Nash, Don Loker, and Major Ruth, Palos Verdes Corporation fire expert, will visit each Rolling Hills residence during their survey. They plan to invite members of the County Fire Department to accompany and assist them. Three alternative plans for construction of a fire house to house Rolling Hills fire fighting equipment were presented to the Board by Fred Banta, Frank Baden, and James Friend, who have been studying the needs. No final selection was made at the recent meeting but authority was given to the three man committee to choose the one which best fills the community needs. Authorization was given for the necessary construction expenditures. The alternative plans differed chiefly in the source of material and included the use of surplus buildings from the U.S. armed forces. After considerable discussion, the board resolved to ask Rolling Hills residents to contact association directors before soliciting donations for any worthy cause. It was believed that such plan might prevent duplication

**Warning Issued To Veterans On Tax Exemptions**

J. G. Caldwell today issued a last-minute warning to veterans that only a few days remain to apply for two important benefits. June 30 is the final day on which veterans owning property may file applications for the veterans' property tax exemption with the county tax assessor. It is also the deadline for amputee veterans of World War II to have their eligibility certified in order to obtain one of the free automobiles granted them by the Federal Government, unless a last-minute extension is approved by Congress. The tax exemption, granted to veterans of all wars and certain peace-time campaigns, applies to city and county property taxes on \$1,000 of valuation, provided the total valuation of property owned by the veteran does not exceed \$5,000. Exemptions granted now are for the fiscal year 1947-48, and Caldwell pointed out that veterans must file each year to receive the exemption. The veteran must have been the owner of record as of the first Monday in March to be eligible.

**Equalization Hearing Set For July 7 To 18**

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors will start its sessions as a Board of Equalization Monday, July 7, and the period between July 8 and 18, inclusive, will be the only time the Board may accept petitions for reductions in assessed values of property owned in the county. This was revealed by W. A. Smith, supervisor of the First district. "Many organizations can qualify for a reduction in assessed value with subsequent savings on their tax bill, if they make a proper showing before the Board of Equalization," he stated. "It is our desire to give consideration to every case of merit, and yet the showing must be made before the board in order for us to consider it at all. It is unfortunate that the state law is so worded that this procedure is necessary, but we must follow the strict interpretation of the law." He stated that in cases where organizations may have property which can qualify for reduced assessed value, they should have some representative appear before the board during the foregoing period. Among organizations referred to were civic, women's clubs, lodges, charitable institutions, private schools, churches and the like.

**County Inspects Vacation Spots For Youth Groups**

In preparation for the anticipated half million picnickers and summer residents in Los Angeles County's mountain vacation spots, inspectors from Los Angeles County Health Department made their rounds last week checking on sanitation of water supplies, sewage, housing, and food. Most of the 60 camps operated by youth organizations opened this week (June 23, 1947). As permits to operate were applied for, health inspectors checked the premises and made recommendations as to necessary improvements and repairs, following the winter shut-down. Final investigations show that the staffs have been on hand for a week or more painting, cleaning, and repairing equipment preparatory to a weekly load of 3,000 boys and girls. "Weekly inspections during the summer season are also made of the water in swimming pools and lakes used by campers, as well as other possible insanitation," H. L. Messier, chief of mountain and rural sanitation, said, "and these must be kept to the State and County standards at all times."
