

Pay For Men On Guard Training Found Deductible

Wages or salaries paid employees on leave to attend National Guard or Army or Naval Reserve field training periods are deductible as business expense for federal income tax purposes, Brig. Gen. D. H. Hudelson, assistant commander of the 40th Infantry Division, said he was informed yesterday.

Hudelson said he was told in a letter from E. I. McLarney, deputy commissioner of internal revenue in Washington, D.C. "It is held that the amount paid by employers to their employees who are members of the military forces, including reserves of the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps and National Guard organizations, while attending to military duties, are ordinary and necessary business expenses and constitute additional compensation for services rendered."

"Such payments, therefore, are deductible from gross income by the employer. These payments of wages are subject to the withholding tax in the same manner as other wages," McLarney wrote.

Fire Victims Get Red Cross Rehabilitation

Rehabilitation needs for some 45 victims of the recent brush fire in the Chatsworth area are now being cared for by the Los Angeles and Oxnard chapters of the American Red Cross.

James R. Dancy, disaster director for the local chapter, so announced this week as arrangements for housing and other needs were made.

Some 75 families registered for Red Cross assistance of some kind during the first three days of the disaster. Food, blankets and clothing were issued by Red Cross workers to the homeless while canteen mobile units conducted roving service to feed firefighters throughout the area.

An airmail postcard from Walter T. Fuller of Washington, N. J., last week had local Chamber of Commerce members quibbling over correct answers to numerous questions.

It was quickly pointed out that since the prevailing winds in Torrance come from the Southwest and as most of the industry is concentrated in the east and northeast portion of the city, smog can be no serious problem here.

Tougher to reply was: "How often do earthquakes occur?" One pioneer of this area stated firmly, "whenever the earth shakes near Torrance, it also shakes in Torrance." And another local citizen was equally firm in attributing the quakes to pressure built up within the growing community.

"Do such pests as scorpions, rattlesnakes and black widows make living here dangerous?" One local official confessed having seen black widow spiders years ago, but suggested that since people move around so fast

in Torrance, junk does not accumulate long and those conditions under which spiders thrive, do not exist. Scorpions are virtually unheard of here, so they cannot be called a real menace, and rattlesnakes have confined their activities to the hills, shying away from all signs of human habitation.

Having read of the nearby oil wells extending out into the ocean, our eastern reader wishes to know if that doesn't pollute the water. Thousands of Torrance beachgoers can testify to the cleanliness of nearby surfs and can answer a further question on the beaches. "Are they free to the public or are fees charged for swimming?" None will deny that the public beaches in Southern California are just that, public.

A final query from the New Jerseyite: "Every community has something; what are your obnoxious pests?" drew varied comment. All were agreed that Torrance definitely has something, but obnoxious pests ranged from gophers in the front lawn to swallows in the garage,

BEST TRAFFIC IDEA

The "Stop" sign may be a nuisance to the motorist when it interferes with his progress along the side street or secondary road, but it is outstanding among modern traffic control devices. It saves many more stops than it requires in the life of the average driver.

Without its protecting presence at the entrance to the main trunk line and boulevard, users of these main ways, who comprise the bulk of traffic, would be required to slow down at all intersections and stop at many of them—the latter in case the normal right-of-way rule prevailed as it necessarily must. This is an angle of the "Stop" sign's existence that receives altogether too little attention.

POISON OAK Warning Given By Dr. Gilbert ROY O. GILBERT, M.D. Los Angeles County Health Officer

Poison oak reminds most people of painful experiences to be avoided, yet many do not recognize the plant when they see it. Learning to recognize it on sight is relatively easy if one closely examines the distinctive identifying characteristics of the plant. There is then a good chance to avoid it or, if one must work among it, to take preventive measures to escape poisoning. The most characteristic feature of the plant is that the leaves always consist of three leaflets arising from a common stem.
