Mrs. Grace W. Wright Moderator For Torrance Education Advisory Group

Mrs. Grace Wright, vice president of the Torrance City Board of Education, was elected moderator of the Torrance Educational Advisory Committee Thursday at a meeting held at noon in Daniels Blue room. The group decided that since it is organized as a "discussion" group and not one for "action," a moderator rather than a permanent chairman will better serve the purpose. The moderator will have no vote in the affairs of the organization.

At the meeting of the committee it was announced that girl students attending Torrance high school starting Sept. 15 will not be required to wear uniform, and that after February, the end of the first semester, the uniform question will be put up to a vote of the students. Redondo Union high school girls wear dark skirts and white blouses.

As to attendance at Redondo high, it was announced by Superintendent J. H. Hull that all those who attended Redondo last year may continue there this year and transportation to Redondo will be furnished. Such transportation as is needed to Torrance high school will be furnished either by the high school or by use of the Torrance elementary and public buses where high school buses are not available.

It was announced that the Torrance Unified School district program is progressing rapidly, with the signing of petitions calling for an election to unify the elementary and high schools, and that Redondo trustees and school officials are in full accord with the program. The high school this year is under Redondo, as a result of a vote of the people on Jan. 24 following ratification of the City Charter of Torrance.

Dr. Saunders, First President Of Palos Verdes J.C., Experienced

Dr. Richard Prescott Saunders, first president of Palos Verdes college, which opens September 18 in Rolling Hills, is no novice at steering a college through the hectic period that confronts every new institution. In 1939 he was the founder and first president of New London (Connecticut) Junior College, on which Palos Verdes college will be patterned.

Before his successful experience at New London, which lasted until the war, Dr. Saunders was active for many years in educational circles. His varied experience include serving as an instructor in the Evening Adult School of the Brooklyn Central YMCA instructing at New York university, assisting the director of the Institute of Education of NYU, and acting as director of the off-campus credit program for NYU.

Dr. Saunders has also served as president of the Connecticut Conference of Junior Colleges and as a member of the executive committee of the New England Junior College Council.

But Dr. Saunders is not only a teacher and an administrator. Until he decided to become a professional educator and to secure his doctoral degree, which he received from NYU in 1938, he was for many years a real estate executive with Radio-Keith-Orpheum Corp. During the war, he was with the USO in a similar capacity. His dual experience in both business and educational fields makes Dr. Saunders ideally fitted to head an institution such as Palos Verdes college.

The college, offering a two-year program in general liberal arts, art, drama, and business administration, is a small, private, co-educational institution specializing in small classes and individualized attention. Enrollment for the first year will be limited to 60 resident and 25 day students. Thereafter, as accommodations permit, the student body will gradually be increased to 350 young men and women.
