

# Police Lose Playoff Opener 13-2; Oilers Top Alloy Diecraft 9-2

Oakland's Golden Glows chalked up a 13-2 triumph over the Los Angeles Police Sunday in the first of a two out of three game series of the state semipro baseball championship at Brookside park, Pasadena.

The teams will move north this week playing the second and third game if necessary at Oakland Sunday. The Police were winners of the recent Southern California Semipro tournament sponsored by the American Legion and held at the Torrance baseball park.

Originally scheduled for the Torrance park, the state playoff game was moved to Brookside park after manipulation by the Pasadena Junior Chamber of Commerce.

In the meantime, at the Torrance park, a game scheduled to replace the playoff, between the Signal Oilers and Alloy Diecraft, saw the Oilers coast to an easy 9-2 victory.

Fred Harris hurled eight innings for the locals holding the Alloy squad to two tallies off five hits. Harris also had a good day at the plate with two hits in four tries.

Manager Art Swartz went in as a relief hurler in the ninth frame and came off with one hit against him.

Young Leonard Swartz, 13-year-old son of Manager Art, went in as catcher for the last three innings, turning in an excellent job as backstop.

Big guns at the plate for the Oilers were centerfielder Lane Shanks and first sacker Dale Coogan. Shanks had a perfect day, with three hits for three tries, one a two-bagger, driving in two runs and scoring three.

Coogan also hit three times, including a long three-bagger, batting in three tallies.

Proving to be one of the fastest men on the base paths for the Oilers, young short-stop Don Maltot added three more stolen bases to his credit during the afternoon. On base three times, Maltot also crossed the plate with three of the local tallies.

Another familiar face was welcomed to the park Sunday with the return to the Oiler roster of Joe Stein, fiery second sacker.

Following the initial sign-up and physical checkups tonight and tomorrow night, Brown will hold the first practice next Tuesday night at 7 p. m. Workouts will be held nightly, Monday thru Friday, until school registration on September 29, when they will switch to day time.

## Redondo School Girl Entered In Aquaplane Race

Following in the footsteps—or, rather, splashing wake—of her famous father, diminutive fifteen-year-old Sherry Rodecker, daughter of Frank Rodecker, one-time holder of the national championship aquaplane title, will seek to regain the crown for the family name.

The blonde and petite Redondo Beach schoolgirl has filed application to ride in this year's first post-war renewal of the nationally famed annual 44-mile aquaplane race Sept. 7 from San Catalina island to California's South Bay beach cities which her father won in 1938, setting a world's record and finishing with a broken arm. Rodecker's mark was bettered in 1939 by Dale Carpenter.

"Father's not at all enthusiastic about my entering the race," Sherry says, "but I finally convinced him that his knowledge and experience of past races will help me avoid the mishaps he encountered by learning the hard way."

Already in training for the "Great Ironingboard Derby" to be held next Sept. 7, Sherry is aquaplane riding daily at increasingly faster speeds to condition for the gruelling course which extends from Catalina to Redondo, Manhattan and Hermosa beaches.

Although several women have ridden in the seven annual pre-war races, none have yet won the event, according to Frank Chapman, a g. e. president of the Aquaplane Race association.
