

Legion Baseball Tournament Play Entering Final Stages

CROWDS THROUGH LOCAL PARK AS FOUR MORE TEAMS DROP OUT OF CHAMPIONSHIP PLAY

Final stages of the Torrance Tournament were reached this week with four more teams eliminated from play since last Wednesday.

Play in the third round of competition was marked by several close, hard-fought contests, with hurling contributing the major winning factors in most games.

Outstanding performances of the tournament have been turned in by the veteran Tillie Schaffer for the Alloy Diecraft club and young Wally Hood of Raul Dedeaux Trojans.

Schaffer stopped the Inglewood Hams cold in Tuesday night's elimination game with two hits, whiffing 15 batsmen to blank the Hams 2-0.

Hood hurled three-hit ball last Saturday night to put the Burke's Giants out of competition, 8-4.

Monday night the Los Angeles Police advanced to the fourth round undefeated by virtue of a ten-inning 3-1 victory over the Arcadia Cards.

Tuesday evening the Signal Oilers, 1946 champs, ran across two tallies in the final inning to eliminate the Jugoslav-American club from San Pedro, 10-8 in a neck and neck scramble marked by heavy hitting by both sides.

The Long Beach Rockets pounded out an 11-5 win over the House of Riley in last Wednesday night's game to advance undefeated to the third round. The former Elbees under the management of Bill Felstner, grabbed 10 tallies off eight hits in the first four innings to bat Harlan Grosshans from the mound.

Thursday evening, the Huntington Park Robins knocked the Padre Jrs. out of the competition in a scrambled game 9-6, which saw the young Padres commit eleven blunders on the

field to blow what seemed to be a good lead.

Friday night the Montebello Dodgers cut down the Kelman Electric nine 5-0, behind the sixth hurling of veteran Ervin Coultts, to advance to the third round with a clean slate.

Saturday night's elimination contest saw the Dedeaux Trojans slap out a decisive 8-4 victory over the vaunted Burke's Giants, Blackie Leslie's former Iron Workers. Wally Hood hurled three-hit ball for the Trojans, whiffing twelve Giants batsmen in the process.

In the opening game of the third round Sunday night, the Los Angeles Police nine took the first extra-inning game of the tournament from the Arcadia Cards, 3-1, running across two big tallies in the tenth frame. Mel Harner started on the mound for the Police squad, but was relieved by Ken Brondell in the sixth after the Cards had tied the score at 1-1. Brondell was credited with the win after he held Bill Goodman's lads to two singles for the remainder of the game.

Tonight the House of Riley and Kelman Electric clubs tangle in another elimination contest, and Friday night the Huntington Park Robins meet the Dedeaux Trojans, winners of these two games to meet in the fourth round game on Tuesday.

Saturday evening opens the fourth round with the Los Angeles Police matched against the winner of the Long Beach Rocket-Montebello Dodger game played last night.

Arcadia will meet the loser of last night's game on Sunday night.

Signal Oilers Stay In Play; Beat J-A Club

A timely line single off the bat of young Don Mallot with the bases loaded and two out in the ninth inning, drove in two runs to break an 8-8 tie and give the Signal Oilers its second win of the Torrance Tournament, and eliminated the Jugoslav-American club from competition.

Hard hitting by both clubs had kept the game nick and tuck up to that point with the young Slavs coming from behind to tie up the ball game three times before the fatal last frame.

The Oilers jumped off to a six-run lead in the top of the second inning, but the Slavs came right back to score six of their own tallies to match it up.

The locals got another marker in the third and held that lead until the fifth when Slav Catcher Dong Ballard drove across the tying run with a long single.

Once again in the top of the eighth the Oilers scored one on an error by the catcher to go out in front, but a home run inside the park by Slav Left-fielder Jerry Zuveia made it all even.

In the ninth the San Pedro hurler, Nello Saggiari, walked three men to load the bases, and with two down, the young Oiler short-stop, Don Mallot, lined a clean single to the left to score Briganti and Porter for the winning margin.

Andrew "Pullman" Porter hurled for the locals and was hard hit, giving up 14 singles, but held on to set the Slavs down for the full nine frames. The long colored right hander whiffed nine Slav batsmen.

Sunday afternoon the Oilers meet the San Pedro Merchants at Navy Field in San Pedro in a regular game.

Last Sunday afternoon the Oilers visited the North American Mustangs at their new field and soundly walloped the Flyers 13-5.

The Mustangs grabbed five tallies off the slants of Fred Harris in the first three innings, but was relieved by young Paul "Lefty" Pettit, Narbonne high school mound ace who hurled six near-perfect innings, allowing no hits and striking out ten opposing batters while walking only three.

Report Prospects Bright for 1947 California Deer Season Now Open

"Make way for the nimrods—D-Day for deer hunting is next Thursday in most of the coastal area of California."

Such is the reminder issued today as the State's 1947 deer season gets under way Aug. 7 in most of the hunting areas located between the Pacific Ocean boundaries and highway 99. This includes San Diego, Orange, Los Angeles, Ventura, Santa Barbara, San Luis Obispo counties, portions of San Bernardino and Riverside counties, and 19 Northern California counties. Inland and High Sierra areas will open their seasons on Sept. 16, the day following the close of the coastal area season.

Prospects look exceedingly bright for good deer hunting this year, particularly in view of the fact that several areas which formerly were closed to hunters, will be open this season.

Several Southland areas which are expected to furnish good deer hunting this year include the Henshaw-Palomar area in San Diego County, the Little Rock reservoir section in Angeles Forest, the Pine Mountain and Boquet Canyon areas in Los Angeles County and the section between the Ojai-Maricopa road and the Ridge Route in Ventura County. The Redwood area in Mendocino County was recommended for those who wish to travel north for their hunting. It is suggested that hunters check with the Forestry Service for latest information pertaining to fire closures in the hunting areas.

In cautioning of the dangers of shooting accidents, all hunters, both professional and ama-

teurs, are advised to wear distinctive colored clothes or headgear, preferably red, and to clearly identify their targets before firing.

"Above all, make sure your targets have four legs, and not two," they are warned. "Far too many injuries and deaths result each year because of eager hunters being a few seconds too quick on the trigger."
