Miss Helen Lockwood comes to the Association with wide experience to qualify her as head of the work center. She is a graduate of Elmira college (1938) and received her master's degree from Columbia university majoring in guidance and English (1940). She has also studied at Penn state college, Union Theological seminary, Juillard School of Music, Bendle Hill, Rhode Island state college and at the Dale Carnegie School of Public Speaking.

She has been a principal and instructor at the Sabinsville, Pa., high school, an instructor at Endicott high school, N. Y., counselor for two years at Stevens college, a volunteer worker for the New York Federation of Churches, a counselor at Hull House. She has done research work with social agencies in Pendle Hill, tutoring Mexican students. She has been the director of the Student Union at Rhode Island state college and has just completed work as dean of the night school at Burton Junior college in Charlotte, N. C. Miss Lockwood will arrive Sept. 8 to assume her new duties and will be a member of the San Pedro staff with full time to be devoted to Torrance YWCA work.
