

EIGHT DAYS OF RACING AT FAIR IN SACRAMENTO

The best running and harness horses at the fairs circuit this fall, plus handicap stars from several name stables such as Charles Howard and Bill Gilmore, are expected to compete for \$75,600 in purses at the 1947 California State Fair in Sacramento, August 28 through September 7.

The eight days of racing will be opened Friday, August 29, with the Inaugural Handicap for three-year-olds and up, a mile and 70 yards, the purse is \$1,500.

M. W. D. Committee To Recommend New District Include County Area

Lomita this week still was part of a proposed West Basin Water district.

The Water Problems Committee of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California Friday voted unanimously to recommend to the Metropolitan Board that it approve formation of the West Basin district to comprise territory agreed on last May 9th.

The committee further recommended that the Metropolitan Board meet on September 5th to facilitate final acceptance of the district proposal.

On last May 9th, the Metropolitan Board agreed that the proposed annexation should encompass: all territory south of Inglewood and west of the Los Angeles Shoestring strip, not now served by Metropolitan, except the cities of Gardena and Hawthorne, and including the territory east of the strip lying south of 223rd st., and east of Wilmington ave., and north and west of the Los Angeles city boundaries.

This area includes, in main, the five coastal cities of Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, El Segundo, Manhattan Beach, and Palos Verdes Estates and the unincorporated areas of Lomita, Lennox, Lawndale and Palos Verdes.

The action on the boundaries was taken by the Water Problems committee following a hearing attended by a large number of West Basin representatives.

Mayor Charles H. Wortham of Redondo Beach served as spokesman for the new district proponents and, asked that no substantial change be made in boundaries previously set by the Metropolitan.

The recommendation by the Water Problems committee will be the second such action that that committee has taken in

the past four months. The committee's original boundary recommendation on May 9th was adopted by the Metropolitan, without substantial change.

Following this move, the Metropolitan Board, apparently taking into consideration the recommendations of O. A. Gierlich's South Bay Engineering committee, representing the sponsors of the proposed district, agreed to pay \$1,600,000 for a feeder line stretching well within the limits of the enlarged district.

Proponents of the proposed district hope that on September 5th the Metropolitan Board will formally advise the local group that Metropolitan will consider the new district (if formed) as an acceptable unit for annexation as a participating member of Metropolitan.

This action will be the signal for starting petitions to call for an election to form the new district.

Landlords Rush To Sign Leases Under New Law

Landlords and tenants are signing voluntary leases calling for an increase in rent rates at an increasing tempo, under the Housing and Rent Act of 1947.

C. H. Blaylock, associate area rent director of the Long Beach branch rent control office, reports that thus far his office has received 2,061 leases, and that the number of leases being filed is increasing steadily.

The average lease, Blaylock said, calls for an increase of about 13 percent in the rent rates, compared with an average increase of 13 percent for the nation. Many leases, he said, are being rejected by his office be-
