## Released Time Classes Given Schools' Okay

The Torrance City Board of Education, meeting in regular session, August 19, 1947, granted the request of the newly organized Torrance Interfaith Committee to conduct released-time classes in religious education in Torrance.

In a letter addressed to the Rev. H. Wesley Roloff, chairman of the Interfaith Committee, Superintendent J. Heinrich Hull said: "The Board of Education approved of the plan and decided to accept your suggestion of released time, controlled through the Interfaith Committee, within the limitations of the Educational Code."

During the past week, members of First Christian church of Torrance took affirmative action in regard to cooperation in a released-time program. Mrs. Florence S. Peckham was appointed as their representative on the Interfaith Committee. Other members of this committee include the Rev. Fr. J. McGuinness, vice chairman; the Rev. Clyde Ruckman, secretary; and the Rev. Paul Perry, representative of the Evangelical Released-Time, Inc. group.

The Interfaith Committee now is making active plans to initiate classes in religious instruction for pupils of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades in the Torrance Elementary and Fern Avenue schools. Such plans as the group may suggest are subject to the approval and the amendment of the local school personnel.

The local Interfaith Committee was organized to serve as a clearing and coordinating agency between religious bodies desiring to conduct religious classes on released time within the Torrance City School district, and to conduct all negotiations with the authorities of the public school system as to extension of the released-time privilege, as to regulations governing release, as to schools in which such work shall be done and any other arrangements necessary to operation of released-time in a given school.

## Amvets Commander Decries Failure Of Congress To Adopt UMT Program

The Pearl Harbor of World War III is the "shameful failure of Congress" to act before adjournment on the long-pending Universal Military Training program, William A. Burkett, newly elected State Commander of the American Veterans of World War II (AMVETS) charged today. His charge was made before a meeting of the State executive committee of AMVETS. Support of the Universal Military Training program and of the California National Guard were voted as keynotes of AMVETS state policy.

In urging the passage of the program by the next Congress, Burkett said, "Further delay would be suicidal in view of world conditions. Demobilization of our armed forces without having prepared in advance a permanent plan for national defense has thrown a deplorable and dangerous element of doubt into our national security. Without preparedness, diplomacy, our first line of national defense, is bankrupt. In essence, Universal Military Training is not a plan for war but a plan for peace. We, as

veterans who have to fight the next war, gravely criticize Congress for foundering in a welter of indecision and inaction on this vital matter and adjourning without completion of its task."

An AMVET organizational caravan will begin a tour of California to arouse veteran interest in the California National Guard program, and to help bring to bear the overwhelming force of public opinion for adoption of Universal Military Training Burkett announced.

The Executive Committee meeting remarked that AMVETS recently was granted a charter by Congress and signed by President Truman. This certification makes AMVETS the first World War II veterans organization with full federal recognition. Its membership of over 200,000 in 48 states, with 2400 members in California, is composed solely of ex-servicemen and women.

The declaration of State policy was a forerunner for the second annual State Convention of AMVETS to be held in Long Beach, September 5, 6, 7.

## 40 Thousand To March In C. I. O. Parade Monday

Forty thousand marchers, 25 "living action" floats and 15 crack bands will constitute the CIO section of Los Angeles' greatest Labor Day parade next Monday.

The CIO parade line-up was announced today, consisting of 18 divisions and more than 100 local unions. The marchers will form on Broadway and adjacent side streets, from Washington Blvd., south to 23rd St. The CIO parade will start moving down Broadway at 10:30 o'clock, immediately after the last AF of L division has cleared the formation area.

On each of the 25 giant floats, living characters will enact some phase of the CIO's national program. The floats will depict the fight for labor unity, for peace, against Fascism at home and abroad, for full employment and against another depression, for fair employment of Negro and other minority workers, for anti-lynch and anti-poll tax legislation, for veterans' rights, for better housing and a number of other points.



A slate of candidates sponsored by the Better Government League Thursday was elected to fill vacancies on the Hawthorne City Council caused by the recall on June 3 of Mayor Walter J. Hawley and Councilmen Wilbur M. Long and Clarence Wilbanks.

Those elected are Harold Crozier, former mayor, who polled 887 votes; Dr. Lawrence Henry, 1184 votes, and William Ritter, 1104 votes.

Sharp Greenwood, who ran as an independent candidate, received 725 votes and Gordon Bourston, a write-in candidate, polled 478.

Of the total voter registration of 4344, there were 1708 or about 39 per cent, votes cast.

The class will begin September 17 at 2 o'clock, and will be given every Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Mary Ullman, public health nurse in the Torrance health district, will be in charge of the classes as instructor.

Mrs. Ullman formerly taught home nursing courses for the American Red Cross in Philadelphia, and recently completed post graduate work in public health nursing at U.C.L.A. She is corresponding secretary for the Torrance Business and Professional Women's club and was formerly with the Visiting Nurses' Association here. Her special district includes the Gardena-Torrance areas.

These classes are open to all prospective mothers in the district as they are an educational service offered by the Los Angeles county health department.
