Two Trends Seen In Decorative Fabrics For Modern Homes

Two definite trends are in evidence in the new draperies and decorative fabrics now being offered American homemakers.

First, accentuation of color is achieved by grouping of color masses in which the shapes are simple. Sometimes several colors are grouped in small squares, circles or rectangles. These groupings of color are repeated. This treatment which emphasizes spots of color rather than design forms is a novel and welcome relief from plain monotone draperies and upholstery fabrics. The best of these fabrics are handblock.

Second, many new decorative fabrics emphasize linear design with less emphasis on color. These fabrics, many of which are imported, have outline designs in color upon neutral backgrounds. In this way the feeling of solidity, common to more conventional types of decorative fabrics, is avoided.

Both of these types of fabrics offered for modern home interiors fit in well with Oriental rugs, which are rich in both design and color. Centuries ago Oriental weavers learned the trick of spotting masses of color so as to create pleasing chromatic harmonies. If a woman wishes to make her room more colorful she can now find draperies which echo in small masses the colors in the rug. Thus, with these new draperies it is possible to have warmth of color without the formality that comes from plain, solid-color draperies and upholstery.

Use of the outline figured draperies, not containing heavy masses of color, is indicated in rooms having deep tones in paint or paper on the wall. Because used in decoration are found in Oriental rugs, the new fabrics which emphasize line and form graciously complement Oriental rugs.

In rooms having plain walls, whether heavily grayed or strong in color, both of the new types of decorative fabrics emphasizing color masses or linear design, are especially appropriate. With them many an ordinary room can be raised above the commonplace.
