Spurned Suitor Attempts Suicide After Spree

David Everett, 30, Hermosa Beach, was reported still in critical condition yesterday morning at the Harbor General hospital, Torrance after shooting himself twice, once in the forehead and once in the neck.

The shooting, according to police, climaxed a three-day spree of philanthropy following disappointment in love. Two weeks ago Janet Everett, 17, a first cousin, decided to return the \$700 ring he had given her.

Despondent, Everett drew his savings out of the bank and tossed away \$2,000 during a love-love spree, police said. Included among his handsome gratuities for small services were \$100 bills to a newsboy, taxicab driver and waitress.

Tuesday, police said, Everett appeared at the Hermosa Beach trailer camp, home of his uncle, R. S. Everett, and precipitated a quarrel with Janet. When the girl's father objected, police reports show, Everett fired two shots at him and then turned the gun on himself.

Doctors gave him less than a 50-50 chance to survive.
