**WORLD CRUISE ON BOARD USS TOLEDO**

William R. Campbell, W.I. 2nd Class, U. S. Navy, husband of Mrs. Harriett Campbell, 1221 El Prado ave., is serving aboard the heavy cruiser USS Toledo, which is making a world-wide cruise. This first extensive peacetime cruise of the Toledo will include stopovers at such foreign ports as Gibraltar; Port Said, Egypt; Bahrain; Ras at Tanura, Saudi Arabia; Bombay, India; Colombo, Ceylon; Singapore, Malaya; and Yokosuka, Japan, where the ship will relieve the USS Fall River of the flag of Rear Admiral A. M. Bledsoe, USN, Commander Cruiser Division One. The Toledo will cruise in the Western Pacific area for an indefinite period.

**Extra Money For Guardsmen Adds Interest Here**

Extra money amounting to \$157.50 a year, for a private, or as high as \$346.50 a year for a first sergeant, awaits recruits for the 578th Engineer Combat Battalion of the California National Guard, according to Major Clyde Carpenter, commander. Based on 48 training periods per year and 15 days' summer field training, a private will be paid \$157.50 a year, a private first class, \$168.16; corporal, \$189.00; sergeant, \$209.84; staff sergeant, \$241.34; technical sergeant, \$283.50 and a master or first sergeant, \$346.50. In addition, uniforms are furnished and food and quarters supplied at the 15 days' summer training camp.

Enlisted men of the 578th Engineers Combat battalion will compete in a two-month recruiting contest starting on National Guard Day, September 16, to enlist a quota of 140 new members in the local Unit and try for a state recruiting prize which will include an airplane trip to Washington and the Army-Navy football game, Major Carpenter announced.


In addition to basic privates, who will be trained in various specialties, the 578th will enlist World War II veterans in their highest wartime grade in the following military specialties: mechanics, engineers, heavy equipment operators, surveyors, clerks and other specialists. The state winner of the recruiting contest will be a guest of the War Department on the Washington trip. With other state winners he will visit the White House, be entertained at luncheon by Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson and members of Congress, tour the Capital, attend a New York broadcast of the National Guard Assembly, the network radio program sponsored by the National Guard and starring Paul Whiteman, and attend the Army-Navy gridiron clash in Philadelphia on November 29.

Major Carpenter pointed out that men between the ages of 17 and 35 may enlist in the National Guard now and participate in the contest themselves. The 578th meets every Tuesday night at 7:30 in the temporary armory at Torrance Municipal Airport, 101 Highway, and men interested in volunteering are urged to attend any weekly meeting.
