Mrs. Hannah Quandt, 81, died Friday afternoon at her home, 22508 Ocean ave., following a lengthy illness.



Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at the family home with Gamby's in charge. The Rev. O. Theodore Goodwin, of San Jacinto, a long time friend of the deceased and her family, officiated. Interment was in the family plot in Inglewood Park cemetery.

Surviving are her widower, Charles H. Quandt, two sons, Lewis of Fresno and Carl of San Jacinto; three daughters, Alice Thomas and Martha Riggle, of Torrance and Edith Thatcher, of Waukegan; 12 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Born at Kapac, near Flint, Mich., the deceased came to California with her family at the age of 10. She later met Mr. Quandt and following their marriage at a Wilmington church on Oct. 16, 1887, the couple moved immediately to their ranch in the Meadpark district of West Torrance.

Beloved by all who knew her, Mrs. Quandt was known for her beautiful humanitarian outlook on life and her kind treatment of her fellow man.

The Quandt family has been identified with the Quandt Pumping, which they sold last year to the Torrance Water District No. 2 and which had supplied water to the Waukegan area for more than 25 years.

Council Vacancy In Doubt; Powell Ends Services

hour after the paper hit the street. Copies are usually available at news stands for several days following publication, and the Herald regrets that it did not anticipate the greater demand and increase the press run last week.

Haggard, it is said, is willing to accept the appointment provided there are "no strings attached," but states that he would return the \$50 a month councilmanic salary to the City Treasury.

"I am wholeheartedly in favor of the Chamber of Commerce program for 'streamlining' of the city government and finances in order to get our city affairs in shape to fully participate in the huge development which is destined for this area in the next ten years," Haggard stated yesterday to a Herald representative.

Among the sweeping changes proposed are:

1. A city manager form of government.
2. Elimination of Council salaries.
3. Repeal of the 10-cent tax per \$100 assessed valuation originally voted for civic promotion and advertising.
4. Abolition of the City Sales tax permanently.
5. Creation of a Municipal Airport Commission.
6. Prohibiting of public gambling casinos in Torrance.
7. Permanent prohibition on parking meters.
8. Creation of a City Recreation Commission to work in conjunction with the City School district in carrying out a joint city recreation-schools program.

A meeting of representatives of all organizations of Torrance, formed as a Citizens Committee, will be held in the Chamber of Commerce on Monday evening, Oct. 6, for the purpose of perfecting a program of action calling for circulation of petitions and an election to bring about the changes.

While the fifth member of the Council still is in doubt, present members have indicated various reactions to the Chamber's program.

Major J. Hugh Sherkey Jr. seemed to resent the plan, indicating that he wants to fight it as being an unwarranted attack on his administration.

Councilman W. H. Tolson said he would like for the Chamber and the Council to "get together" and obviate the necessity for circulation of petitions. He said the Council should call the election.

Councilman C. M. Gilbert, who has been an "independent" member of the Council, was non-committal.




