

WE MUST PREPARE FOR PEACE, NOT WAR, SAYS LIE

"We can gain lasting peace in our time," declares Trygve Lie, secretary general of the United Nations, writing in the current issue of The Rotarian magazine. The answer lies in changing the minds of men from "preparing for war" to preparing for peace.

"Those who can content themselves with the prospect of a temporary respite from war are either more concerned about themselves and the immediate present than they are about their children's and mankind's future," says Lie, "or, what is more probably true, they have just not thought the whole problem through."

"The first basis for an enduring peace is the acceptance by all people of this idea of 'permanency' not as a dream or distant goal, but as the immediate bare minimum of what they desire and demand."

It is illogical to divert wealth into armaments and supplies for war, Lie suggests, when "it is as simple as two-and-two make

four to show that we cannot satisfy even the barest needs of our peoples for food, shelter, heat and clothing, to say nothing of the normal amenities of human existence, unless the individual governments concentrate every last scrap of their resources and energies on these elementary problems."

While agreeing with the principle expressed by Arthur H. Compton in an earlier issue of The Rotarian magazine that a peace of 20 to 30 years might well become permanent, Lie reinforces the famous nuclear physicist's suggestion: "No sane man or woman can be content with a holiday from war. The hard, inescapable fact is that we must never, never experience it again. The next war can very well be civilization's last, in more ways than one."

To those who argue that the United Nations cannot prevent war because it is not yet perfect, Secretary Lie answers:

"Our difficulty arises, partly at least, from habit. We of my generation have known two global wars; the world has been at war for about one-third of our adult lives. Consequently, we can be excused if we have come to accept war as something that DOES happen. Yet I do not think we can continue to be excused if we refuse to shake ourselves out of this pernicious habit of thought and if we do not beat into the collective brains of humanity the realization that war DOES NOT have to happen again."

"Unfortunately, simply stating this problem does not solve it. The trouble is that you cannot persuade people that there is going to be permanent peace so long as nations continue to prepare for an unnecessarily inevitable war. Paying lip service to the ideal of peace, on one hand, and piling up armaments, on the other, simply does not make sense. But you can-

not expect the leading nations of the world to cease preparing for war unless it is done on a collective basis, honestly, unqualifiedly, wholeheartedly and with no suspicion of cheating on the part of anybody."

"Such a renunciation of war, not in words but in actual practice, cannot be achieved unless there stands solidly behind it a very genuine and universal will to abandon war on the part of the people as well as by their political leaders. And here again it is imperative that all peoples, making up all nations, subscribe to the proposition. The existence of a will for war or even a willingness to entertain or tolerate the thought of war on the part of a single nation, or people, however small, would jeopardize the whole proposition."

"To persuade people everywhere that war is now impractical, suicidal and cruelly stupid, must therefore be one of our most compelling tasks. We must absolutely drill into peo-

ple's consciousness this idea: Never again shall nations resort to war. And the emphasis should be placed on the word: 'Never...' "When will the people of the world stop thinking in terms of peace, and accept as axiomatic the premise that war shall never come again."

Many Local Job Opportunities Are Available

Mrs. Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance office of the California State Employment Service, stated today in a brief interview that there are many opportunities available for residents of Torrance and adjoining areas, including Gardena, Harbor City, Lomita, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach and parts of Manhattan Beach.

Some of the types of workers most urgently needed at present are machine and hand pressers for dry cleaning and laundry establishments; spotters who have had silk, cotton, rayon and wool experience; and laundry workers such as routers, checkers and general helpers. There is also a need for arc and combination welders. The Torrance office recently received a request from local employers for women finish inspectors on textile products. There is still a need for stenographers who can furnish their own transportation.

Mrs. Ellis further stated that girls with high school educations have a definite opportunity at the present time for civil service employment as clerk-typists. She stated that girls interested in such employment and who have a typing speed of 40 words a minute should contact the Torrance local office for further information.
