**5 Persons Hurt
In Head-On
Collision Monday**

Five persons were injured in a head-on collision at the intersection of 190th st. and Hawthorne ave. Monday evening when a car driven by Salvador D. Sanchez, 20617 Lawrence dr., was struck by another car driven by Mrs. Ellen D. Harmon, 514 El Redondo, Redondo Beach. The injured, taken to Harbor General hospital, include Mrs. Harmon, Sanchez, Maria Sanchez, Myrtle M. Harmon, also of 514 El Redondo and W. W. Gillis, 520 North Guadalupe, Redondo Beach. Gillis and Myrtle Harmon were passengers in the car driven by Mrs. Harmon. According to Mrs. Harmon, she was attempting to turn north on Hawthorne from 190th st. when an unidentified car approaching from the south refused to slow down, forcing her to stay on the left side of the street and hit Sanchez' car. Mr. and Mrs. Sanchez were given first aid at the hospital and discharged, while the other three persons involved in the accident were admitted to the hospital for treatment of fractures and lacerations.

**STATE, COUNTY FUNDS MAY
LOWER VISTA HIGHLANDS
STREET COSTS 20 PERCENT**

Some 20 percent of the cost of street, curb and sidewalk work in the Vista Highlands district can be met with state and county road funds, City Engineer G. M. Jain told the City Council at the public hearing on the proposed improvement district Tuesday night. He said that Torrance Blvd. and Carson St., both of which are included in the district which would extend between those two streets of major importance from Crenshaw Blvd. west to Maple Ave., can be improved out of the one-fourth cent State gas tax fund, and that County-aid-to-cities money could be used on the sidewalks. Rather than to benefit only those facing on Torrance Blvd., and Carson St., however, he pointed out, it could be spread over all the district since improvements to "streets of major importance" are for the benefit of all the people, not just those whose property faces on such a street. An estimated cost of \$199,402.75 was placed on the project by Harold A. Barnett, engineer, and the one-fourth saving would cut this down to approximately \$150,000. Jack E. Long, chairman of the committee proposing the formation of the district, said that it will be a year before the work can get underway, and that prices will be considerably lower then. One petition of protest, signed by 200 persons, was filed. It stated they were against the district "due to excessive costs." Another petition, signed by 169, said that they were against it unless city funds could be used in the work, such as suggested by Jain. A letter from Long and Fay Parks asked that the district be modified to include property only to Hickory Ave., instead of to Maple Avenue. Thrifty Builders said that they were not protesting the district but that they did not want their property included in the assessment district inasmuch as improvements of the type called for already are installed in their tract. Eddie Dalton protested because "it is a poor time to do

**School Board OKs
\$748 Payment
To Pritchard**

The payment of \$748 to S.V.O. Pritchard, attorney for the Torrance City School District in the recent lawsuit against the Los Angeles City School District, has been authorized by the Torrance School Board. Pritchard successfully fought the action of the Los Angeles School district in attempting to remove the 13 classroom bungalows which had been used by Los Angeles in Torrance. The court held that the bungalows were the property of the Torrance schools in that they belonged to the ground on which they were located. Also preserved for Torrance was real estate valued upwards of \$50,000 which Los Angeles was attempting to sell. It included the 15-acre farm site in North Torrance and the Fern avenue school annex, a block square. Pritchard originally was retained by a group of local civic leaders to assist City Judge John A. Shidler in his taxpayer's suit to prevent Los Angeles from disposing of Torrance taxpayers' property.

Henrich Hull, superintendent of schools, reported. The Perry school did not receive any part of the funds because it had not been a member of the Los Angeles school system.


