Violators of marine fishing laws and regulations will soon find difficulty in evading the patrol officers of the state division of fish and game if present plans are effected.

Approval has been given by the fish and game commission for the acquisition of a second 83 foot offshore patrol vessel and for 10 high speed smaller cruisers for the bays, sloughs, and inland waters patrol forces. All boats will be equipped with 2-way radios.
