ATTENTION TO MOTOR VEHICLE LAWS IS ASKED

Director Edgar E. Lampton of the State Department of Motor Vehicles today explained new traffic laws recently passed by the Legislature, and warned motorists to become familiar with them as soon as possible. Patrons of service stations, driveways, garages or any other establishment reached by driving over a sidewalk, must give right-of-way to pedestrians approaching on the sidewalk, he stated.

The new laws make the driver of a motor vehicle, as well as the passenger, responsible if he knowingly permits the passengers to ride on any portions of the vehicle not intended for them, and make both liable to arrest.

State Hearing On Unification May Be Jan. 9

Tentative date of Jan. 9, 1948 has been set for a hearing before the State Board of Education on the petition of Torrance City School District for the separation of Torrance high school from the Redondo Union High School District, according to advance information received by the office of Superintendent of Schools J. H. Hull.

In the event that the Board approves the petition, the County Superintendent of Schools will call an election which must be held within 20 days thereafter. The election must be advertised two separate weeks and the election probably will be held Jan. 23.

The margin of time for the completion of the unification election by the voters of Torrance and the accomplishment of other details in connection with the program is very small, Hull said. The separation must be completed prior to Feb. 1 if unification is to be achieved as of July 1, 1948.

C. C. Carpenter, assistant county superintendent of schools, has assured Superintendent Hull that arrangements will be made in time.

Warn Landlords On Raising Rent Without Leases

Landlords who collect increases in rents up to 15 percent without entering into a valid written lease are violating the Housing and Rent Act of 1947 and are subject to its penalties for charging more than the maximum legal rent, Charles H. Blaylock, area rent director of the Office of Rent Control, Long Beach, said today.

Blaylock called attention to the lease increase provisions of the Federal rent law because reports have been reaching his office that some landlords have increased rents without executing a written lease.

The law provides, he said, that rents may be increased up to, but not more than, 15 per cent if landlords and tenants "voluntarily enter into a valid written lease in good faith. Such leases will be effective only if they are in writing and signed by both the landlord and tenant on or before Dec. 31, 1947. The lease cannot expire before Dec. 31, 1948 and a copy of it must be filed with the area rent office at 110 E. Anaheim st. within 15 days after the date of signing."

The important point for tenants and landlords to remember is that under specific provisions of the law the lease must be written, Blaylock emphasized. An oral agreement is not valid.

The Los Angeles City School System is negotiating with the Capital Co., a holding company for the Bank of America, for the purchase of an elementary school site near Normont Terrace.

Projected site for the grade school is about five acres in an area bounded by Petroleum and Broadwell avenues and 253rd st., and the projection of 251st st.

No price has been set on the land. The property was approved recently for the school by the Los Angeles Regional Planning Commission.

MOTORCYCLE PASSENGERS PASSING ON RIGHT

If you're a motorcyclist and want to carry a passenger be sure your "motor" is equipped with a seat securely fastened behind you and provided with foot rests or handgrips. Otherwise, you must get a sidecar to transport your passenger.

When passing another vehicle on the right hand side be sure not to leave the paved or main traveled portion of the highway. This clarifies the language of the old law which said that you couldn't pass to the right by driving on the highway shoulder.
