Immediate action will be taken against the city unless business is discontinued, it was said.

"It is a surprise to me that the dump was considered a nuisance," Mayor J. Hugh Sherry Jr. said.

The anti-smog authorities want the city to go to the "cut and cover" method of disposing of trash, but the present problem of additional cost and lack of land where the materials can be burned, it was said.

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
