Lapel Pins Made By TB Patients On Sale Today

Brightly decorated lapel pins and other articles made by male
tuberculosis patients of Harbor General Hospital will be on sale
at 1315 Sartori ave. from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. today, tomorrow and
Saturday.
Sponsored by the Torrance Ladies' Council of the Christian
church, the sale will benefit the
men, some of whom have been
confined to restricted hospital
areas for five to six years. Mrs.
Edward Pietzschke and Mrs. Minnie
Foreman are in charge of the sale.
"Making something out of noth-
ing," the patients have carved
and hand-painted unusual and
delicate pins in the shape of
birds and butterflies from dis-
carded scraps of wood, apple
crates and old lumber.
Working on these articles has
been one of the men's favorite
recreations in the long hours
spent in their isolation quarters
at the hospital, according to C.
L. Edney, general services man-
ager.
Out of approximately 70 in-
mates of the tubercular ward,
"G-Ramp," two-thirds are arti-
sants in their own right, Edney
said.
Housed in the long, white bar-
racks-type units of the hospital,
the tubercular patients arrived at
Harbor one year ago to find sur-
rounding grounds barren. Now a
prosperous garden, crowded with
