**Supervisor Areas Remain Unchanged**

Supervisor districts of Los Angeles County will remain unchanged for another year, according to Chairman Raymond V. Darby, who represents the district which includes Torrance-Lomita-Harbor and South Bay areas of the Board of Supervisors.

Chairman Darby said that earlier this year he asked his colleagues to undertake a re-vamping of boundaries in order to equalize the population which in some districts has risen considerably more than in others.

Other members of the board, however, failed to act on the suggestion and since Wednesday, under state law, the deadline for re-districting, Darby said it is too late now to make any changes.

Darby's fourth district, including Torrance, Lomita, San Pedro, Wilmington, Redondo Beach and other cities, has a voting population of 438,997, approximately 45,000 more than the next largest supervisorial area which is the first district, represented by William A. Smith. Smith's voter population is 394,570.

Darby said that if the re-districting had been authorized he would have given up a section of his area in northeast Los Angeles.

He said he had never contemplated yielding portions of the harbor area.

Early reports had it that Darby would surrender to Supervisor John Roach all the area from Western ave. easterly to the boundary of Supervisor Smith's district in mid-Lomita Beach, including San Pedro and Wilmington.

**Registration Starts Jan. 2**

All eligible voters who desire to register can be registered in the period starting January 2, 1948, in time for the elections.

That was the opinion of County Manager Wayne Allen and Registrar of Voters Michael Donoghue, and concurred in by the Board of Supervisors at its Tuesday meeting, according to chairman of the board, Raymond V. Darby.

The supervisors authorized the registrar of voters to carry out his program of registration as planned and budgeted, starting intensive field work on January 2, 1948.

**2 'Con' Men Get \$2,000 From Local Merchant**

Gust Drake, proprietor of the Ideal Ranch Market, 2057 Torrance blvd., was wiser but poorer by \$2,000 this week after two confidence men had taken him for that amount in the sale of "diamonds" that proved to be glass.

Drake was approached by one of the men who gave him the name as James Monette and who represented himself as a European refugee seeking a long lost brother supposed to have married a Torrance girl.

Monette returned the following day and asked Drake to loan him some money for which he would leave a packet of diamonds as security. Apparently picking two of the stones from the envelope at random, Monette took them to a local jeweler for appraisal, accompanied by Drake.

The appraisal showed one stone worth \$700 and the other \$900. Upon his return to the market, Drake left Monette and drew the \$2,000 from the bank in \$50 and \$100 bills, which he turned over to Monette. After Monette's departure, Drake opened the packet and discovered 15 Mexican glass "diamonds."

Police are seeking Monette and an accomplice who gave him the name as "Dr. Martin" of Santa Ana. "Dr. Martin" is the man whom Drake called and who vouched for the authenticity of the "gems." A check on the number called revealed that it was a public pay phone rather than a doctor's office.

**THREE MAJOR STREET JOBS FOR TORRANCE TO IMPROVE ENTRANCES TO CENTRAL AREA**

Three major street jobs are contemplated for the near future, involving approaches to the central part of Torrance.

Tuesday night the City Council authorized expenditure of \$6,000 for resurfacing of Crenshaw blvd. from 190th st. south approximately one-half mile to the General Petroleum Corp. gate. The city will be reimbursed with County road funds for this work.

According to City Engineer G. M. Jain, the surfacing will raise the street level, to better drain the boulevard, and it will be adaptable to companion paving which will come when Crenshaw blvd. is widened to Dominguez st. Traffic on Crenshaw blvd. has increased nearly 100 percent in recent months, it is reported, and it will be even heavier when the new American-Standard plant is opened on the boulevard, requiring widening.

The second job which is being readied for work is Sepulveda blvd., between Narbonne ave. and the east city limits. The grade will be changed and paving will be 22 feet in width. There will be road mix shoulders, in addition. Kettler Knolls dedicated the right-of-way to the city to provide for the ultimate 100-foot boulevard there, it was said.

A third project is that of opening Cabrillo blvd. south to Eschel man ave., thus providing a new thoroughfare and direct connection with Lomita. Kettler Knolls dedicated the 100-foot right-of-way needed and will install 1,300 feet of sidewalks on Cabrillo ave. The tract also is doing the grading. The city will install curbs, gutters and paving 22 feet wide, with oiled shoulders.

**Torrance Gets \$2,183 From Liquor Fund**

Liquor license fee revenues amounting to \$2,654,185.74, representing the half-year period from Jan. 1, 1947, to June 30, 1947, are soon to be distributed among the cities and counties of the state.

This sum is one-half of license fees collected for that six-month period, which is the share of the cities and counties of the total collected. The state retains the other half.

This is the last allocation which will be made on this basis. In April of next year the major portion of this money will go to the local communities; and thereafter 100 percent of such collections will be made to local communities.

Of this current allocation of \$2,654,185.74, Los Angeles County cities will get \$839,052.45; the unincorporated area \$87,900.01; the City of Torrance \$2,183.12; Gardena, \$1,990.01; and Redondo Beach, \$2,748.12.

**COUNTY CREATES NEW MUSICAL ADVISORY BOARD**

Creation of a Music Commission for Los Angeles county has been ordered by the Board of Supervisors in furtherance of the County's cultural program.

County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy was instructed, by Chairman Raymond V. Darby to prepare an ordinance under which the Supervisors will appoint music authorities to the new Advisory Board on the motion presented by Supervisor John Anson Ford.

The Supervisors annually vote subsidies to many musical enterprises such as Hollywood Bowl, Symphony, County Band, and other such public activities.
