

GARDENA NABS UNDISPUTED SECOND SPOT

The Arabs came to life in the third period as Schindler started to substitute. The El Centro men scored after intercepting a pass, and completed a 17-yard aerial themselves.

After being aided by an interference penalty called on El Camino, John Garner tossed 30 yards to Right End Bob Edlin for the losers' lone touchdown.

Jerry Witt and Contreras teamed up on a march of 70 yards that ended with Witt on a sneak for two yards and the score, Kazarian converting.

The third and fourth strings finished the game for the Warriors with Ray Southstone intercepting a pass to start a 55-yard march. Bob Fletcher, fourth-string quarterback, scored on a three-yard sneak with Irv Gustafson, sub fullback, converting.

This week's game with East L.A. finds the Warriors entering with a five wins and one loss for the season against the invaders three and three record. Schindler's gridgers must win to stay in the present race for the Metro loop crown.

Both of the Santa Monica scores were set up by pass interceptions on the part of Left End Leo Cassalia. From that point, Cassalia added insult to injury by taking a pass on the three and crossing the goal line for six points. The kick was wide.

Santa Monica kicked to the Torrance B's at the start of the second half and two plays later, Cassalia proceeded to intercept another Tartar forward on the 30 and run it back to the three-yard stripe. He then took a pass for the score.

The Torrance line, led by Captain Don Bodner at guard, played good defensive ball holding the Samohi B's to 74 yards on rushing.

This afternoon, the Tartar B's venture forth to Beverly Hills. Coach Cliff Graybell has worked all week on perfecting the scoring punch of his team and hopes to break the goal line jinx that has been bothering them. So far the B's have won one and dropped three in Bay League competition.

Pirates Finish Clean Sweep Of Marine Teams

San Pedro's highly touted Pirates failed to impress Thursday as they defeated a fighting Narbonne eleven, 14-0, in a bruising encounter at the Gauchoes field.

The victory completed the Pirates' clean sweep of the four-team Marine circuit and gave them a clear-cut 3-0 edge at the top of the standings.

San Pedro's first touchdown came late in the initial period as the result of a pass from Ernie Ho to Fred Inde which netted 50 yards and put the ball on the Narbonne 2-yd. line. Bill Wagner took it across from there on fourth down.

Tartars Seek Scoring Punch For BH Game

The Torrance Tartar, licking his wounds after the mauling received from the Santa Monica Viking, will attempt to bounce back at 8 p.m. tomorrow, Friday, Nov. 7, when the Tartars face Beverly Hills in the Redondo Bowl.

Center Ed Fortin, who was injured on the first play of the Santa Monica game and did not return to the fray, will be ready to go against the boys from Beverly Hills.

Captain Jack Hood will also return to competition after missing the Santa Monica game due to a bad knee. This will bring the Tartars back to full strength.

Surprisingly enough, the Torrance gridgers were not too downhearted after losing to the Samohi powerhouse and were encouraged when Beverly Hills barely managed to eke out an 18-13 victory over off-beaten Leuzinger last week.

Tartar Coach Eddie Cole plans to start almost the same line against Beverly Hills as had started most of the season. Hood and Dick Preston will man the ends, Gene Stirling and Al Stephenson at tackle, Rano Sullivan and Onal Harris get the nod at guard, with Ed Fortin at the pivot spot.

The backfield, however, is still Cole's biggest headache. The backs will continue to be shuffled until a quartette is found that can give the Tartars the scoring punch. So far, almost every post is open, with this week's practice sessions to determine who starts and who sits.

Beverly Hills has won three and lost one so far, including a victory over Jordan which in turn has beaten Torrance. However, a football has been known to take very strange bounces and games are not always won on a comparative basis.

The members of the team, beaten but not broken by the Santa Monica steamroller, are getting annoyed at being a doormat and have vowed to win the rest of their contests. If they don't win, they will have tried to win and it will take a better team to beat them.

Tomorrow night will tell whether Torrance is better than Beverly Hills. The Tartars are out for blood and the visitors will have to play a lot of football to beat them.

3rd Straight Won By JV's

The Torrance Junior Varsity football squad annexed their third straight victory Monday afternoon by beating the Inglewood JV's 13-0 on the Torrance field.

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JACK TAYLOR Caught 'Em Napping

Undeclared Santa Monica Wallops Torrance In Easy 46-2 Victory

Scoring almost at will, the undefeated Vikings of Santa Monica, soundly walloped the Torrance Tartars Saturday night at the Redondo Seahawk bowl to the tune of 46 to 2.

The Tartars averted a complete shutout following Jack Taylor's 75-yard quick kick from the Torrance 25. The visitors were caught napping and when Dick Horn, Samohi quarterback, finally picked up the ball on his own goal line, he was hit and knocked into the end zone by Jim Webb, Tartar end, for the safety.

Outside of the two-pointer, it was all Santa Monica. Torrance never got closer to the Viking goal than the 22 yard line in the second period. They lost the ball on downs at that spot after rolling from their own 32, going the 46 yards in seven plays. The drive was sparked by runs of 14 and 11 yards by Bill Morgan and a pass by Dick Turner good for 16 yards, the total Tartar passing gain all evening.

The Vikings wasted no time showing their power, taking the opening kickoff on their 40 and marching across the Tartar goal 60 yards away 12 plays later. Roy Wiseman, Samo left half, made the first of his three touchdowns by going two yards around right end.

Torrance followed the opening score with its safety and never threatened again. Wiseman then repeated his trip to pay dirt time 16 yards around left end, to climax a Santa Monica march of 65 yards in five plays. Horn passed to Halfback Lawrence Neal for the point after touchdown.

In the second period, Horn threw seven yards to Ike Jones in the Tartar end zone for another score, rolling 78 yards in 11 plays. Wiseman skirted right end for the conversion.

The second half opened with Torrance receiving the kick on their own 10 with a 22 yard run back putting the ball in play on the 32-yard stripe. For a few minutes it looked like Coach Eddie Cole had fed his boys vitamin pills during the intermission with Bob Turner rolling off 11 yards, Tom Faren, 3, and Dick Rupert, 15, only to have the attack bog down on the Santa Monica 40, where Torrance was forced to punt.

The third quarter scoring occurred on another Horn to Jones pass good for 43 yards after three plays on which Santa Monica intercepted a Torrance pass, the Tartars bounced back and recovered a Viking fumble and took to the air once again only to have the visitors intercept once again. Santa Monica apparently tired of the "now you have it, now you don't" procedure and scored their TD.

Another third period Samohi score came on a loss from Horn to Wiseman that netted 76 yards. Halfback Jack Kaplan went around end for the conversion. The score came after Jack Taylor quick-kicked an-

other long one good for 61 yards. The ball rolled dead inside the visitors 10 but was put in play on the 20 after being downed by a Torrance player.

Mel "Bobo" Lewis, substitute halfback, got in his licks on a two-yard smash over tackle early in the final period to wind up another Santa Monica scoring drive, this one good for 46 yards in 6 plays.

Santa Monica Coach Jim Sutherland had retired his position after first team in the third quarter but the second and third strings kept up the avalanche of scoring with the seventh and final TD scored by Mel Todd, sub halfback, who made a five yard jaunt to the Torrance end zone and then went over center for the conversion. This score was also the result of a sustained drive, 50 yards in 10 plays.

Playing for a lost cause, Tartar Jack Taylor averaged 42 yards per punt, the only department in which Torrance excelled over the league leaders. Vikings were only forced to punt once and Gene Stirling broke through to block the kick.

Stirling played his usual brilliant game in the line with Morgan getting off for some nice sweeps around end.

The Torrance team was hurt by the absence of Captain Jack Hood who missed the entire game because of a bad knee. The Vikings led the team on the field. Another injury forced Center Ed Fortin out of the game after the first play.
