

Tartar B's Drop 20-12 Decision To Beverly Hills

Outdoing their rivals in every department but scoring, the Torrance B gridders wound up on the short end of a 20-12 count in their game at Beverly Hills last Thursday afternoon.

The "Tarabees" got 17 first downs to 7 for their hosts, out-gained Beverly Hills, 280 yards to 195, but were able to score only twice as the Hillmen carried the ball over the goal three times.

Torrance was unable to score until the third quarter when the passing combination of Boyd Crawford to Ralph Standridge brought the Tartars down to the Beverly Hills two, from which spot Crawford tallied.

In the fourth quarter, Beverly Hills staved off one Torrance scoring threat, talking over on downs on their one-yard line. Torrance got the ball again on the Beverly 17 when the Normans were forced to punt from the two. Six plays later, Crawford hit Standridge with a pass for the score.

All three of the Beverly Hills touchdowns came in the first half as Torrance kept the Normans from even threatening in the third and fourth quarters.

Right half Stanrich of the Normans scored both the Beverly touchdowns in the first period on passes from Smith. The third touchdown came on an off-tackle smash by Brown, left half, after a Tartar pass had been intercepted. Baker made both of the extra points for the home team.

The Tartar B's broke their goal line jinx that had held them scoreless in their three previous games, although the hex bothered them in the first half. Getting started in the third quarter, they were unable to overcome the 20-point handicap.

This afternoon, the "Tarabees" will play host to the Leuzinger B's at Torrance High field.

LYNN BRICKS RETAIN SCFTA LEAD WITH 13-12 VICTORY

The league-leading Torrance Lynn Bricks strengthened their hold on first place in the Southern California Touch Football Association Sunday afternoon by squeaking out a 13-12 win over Dedmon Mobligas at York field, Whittier.

In Torrance the Torrance Johns Club defeated Whittier Sporting Goods, 38-6, in the first game of a double header at the high school field. The nightcap saw the Torrance Theaters break into the win column for the first time this season with a decisive 26-6 victory over the National Home Appliance crew.

Whittier Sporting Goods lost a car full of players on the way to the field and by mutual agreement their game with the Johns was played with six-man teams. The winners scored in every period over their tired but scrappy opponents.

In the first quarter Ralph George threw a 35-yard TD pass to Bill Dietlin and a conversion toss to Gordie Smith for the first seven points. George opened the second period scoring with a five-yard pitch to Don Fulton and Dan Cook passed to Bob O'Caïn for the extra point. George Winters swivel-hipped for 30 yards for another score.

Smith's 35-yard pass was gathered in at midfield by George, who ran the rest of the way for the opening score in the third period. O'Caïn opened the last period with a scoring run of 25 yards. The last John TD was made when George connected with a 20-yard toss to Bill Rogers to bring the winners' total up to 38.

The Whittier team scored their lone tally as the clock ran out Bob Ives passing seven yards to Jack Geddes, who ran the remaining 20 yards to the goal.

The tail-end Torrance Theaters smashed to their first win as they romped over the National Home Appliance in the second local game. Following a scoreless first period, Ernie Floyd put the showmen out in front with a 15-yard pass to Earl Clayton for the TD, with Floyd sweeping end for the extra point.

Clayton followed with another toss good for 15 yards and a score to add another six points to the winners' total. Chuck Nickerson, aroused a ray of hope for the Nationalites as he buzzed end for a score from two yards out making the score read 13-6 at half time.

Hope vanished rapidly for National in the last half, however, as Gar Johnson hit Ernie Nixon with a long pass for a Theater tally in the third period. Clayton followed this closing a 50-yard romp for the league score, throwing a pass to Swayne Johnson for the point after touchdown.
