His education included college work at California Concordia college in Oakland from 1932 to 1938, theological training at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific from 1936 to 1939, and courses at the University of California in Berkeley.



Truant Officer To Crack Down On Absentees

A crack-down on truancy was promoted by F. A. Applegate, attendance officer, at a meeting of Torrance City Board of Education Tuesday night.

Applegate suggested that schools contact him on the first day of absence, if a pupil is known to have truancy tendencies, or where the family is lax in attendance attitudes. Under the Los Angeles school system, there were instances where children had been absent for as long as three weeks before parents were notified.

He also asked that teachers emphasize that, in general, illness of the child should be the only reason for absence, and that some special recognition be given to pupils who maintain good attendance records.

Aid of the County Health office was solicited to handle a "bee" problem among children coming from Lomita flight strip temporary quarters, a situation observed by Applegate during his calls as attendance officer.

During the month 108 home calls were made at the request of school principals. Applegate reported. Other activities of the officer included a check of the area along Western avenue between 213th and 220th streets, where it was determined that no out-of-district children were crossing the boundary line to attend Torrance schools.

Applegate also was in charge of returning five truants to school, taking sick children home from school, issuing work permits for junior high school pupils and maintaining friendly contacts with Mexicans in Pueblo district to encourage better attendance habits.

School Trustees Meeting Slated For December 3

A general meeting of the Los Angeles County School Trustees Association, of which Dr. Howard A. Wood, president of Torrance City Board of Education, is a director, will be held on Dec. 3 at the old Central Junior high school building at 451 N. Hill st., Los Angeles. All members and administrators of the Torrance City Board of Education are planning to attend.

According to Dr. Wood the group of more than 1,000 school district trustees will hear a talk on new legislation by Dr. D. Lloyd Nelson, assistant professor of education at University of Southern California, and witness a demonstration of shop subjects by a State Department of Education team.

Four members of the Torrance board recently attended the convention of the association in Sacramento, and Torrance was the only board which had four members present. They are Dr. Wood, Mrs. Grace W. Wright, vice president; Evelyn L. Carr and George L. Thatcher, members.

Stroh Hears Gov. Warren

Torrance City Chief of Police John H. Stroh attended a statewide law enforcement conference Monday and Tuesday in Sacramento, where he heard Gov. Earl Warren recommend use of the state's 1943 Conspiracy Act to break organized crime.

Gov. Warren urged sending racketeers to prison under the act, which provides that when one or more persons conspire to commit an act ordinarily considered a misdemeanor, prosecution and conviction can be had as a felony, and penitentiary sentences imposed.


