TORRANCE COMMUNITY CHEST DRIVE LAGS

Small gains are reported in the Torrance Community Chest campaign with total contributions now standing at \$8,819 or 40 percent of the complete quota of \$14,525, it was announced last Tuesday by Chairman Sam Levy.

Levy said that the overall campaign contributions have now passed the 50 percent mark and he urged increased efforts on the part of volunteers and cooperation on the part of residents here in order to get Torrance "on schedule" with the other 35 towns and cities in the Chest.

"If we admit," he said, "that the federated financing plan of the Chest is sound—that many communities cooperating together can provide more adequate health and welfare services for their people than any single city could alone, then we must also admit that we have a duty to perform in this campaign."

"Only through our support will the 150 Red Feather agencies be able to serve our youth, our veterans, our families and our aged. Let's complete our share of this job now," Levy said.

Naklanski Dies, Is 5th Traffic Victim Of Year

The year's death toll from automobile accidents was raised to five last Saturday when Lawrence Naklanski, 51, 1205 Border ave., died of head injuries in Harbor General hospital after being struck by a truck on Western ave. near 204th st. last Thursday evening.

The driver of the truck, Wenzel G. Turmes, 15203 Areturus ave., Gardena, told police that he was driving down Western and was unable to avoid hitting Naklanski, who was walking on the edge of the pavement. Turmes was not held.

Services for Naklanski were held at Stone and Myers mortuary at 10 a.m. yesterday by the Rev. Ronald J. Menmuir of the First Christian church. Interment was at Rosevelt cemetery.

An employee of Columbia Steel Co., Naklanski had been a resident of Torrance for the past 22 years. He was born in Minsk, Russia, and came to the United States in 1913. There are no survivors.

Naklanski was the second person killed in automobile accidents in the last month and the fifth so far this year. Torrance police pointed out that while this is not the worst year recorded, five deaths are a large number for a city this size.

Local Christmas Club Members To Get \$90,000

More than 1,150 Christmas Club members in Torrance will begin receiving payments of approximately \$90,000 on Dec. 1 from the two local banks, Torrance National and Bank of America.

Information from Christmas Club, Inc., shows that this is part of the \$747,000,000 to be distributed to 9,500,000 members from 5,500 financial institutions throughout the nation, an increase of more than 17 per cent over last year and an all-time high for the 37 years of Christmas club operations.

The largest single use for the money listed by the national club will be for Christmas purchases, 38 per cent of the members signifying such use. Thirty per cent of the members said they would use the funds for permanent savings while 11 per cent will pay year-end bills with the cash. Other uses are payment of insurance premiums, debt retirement, and taxes.

Payments in the state of California will amount to \$19,600,000, with an average payment of about \$84.50 per member in the larger communities and \$78.50 the average for the entire country.
