Tartar Gridders Meet Fallbrook Thanksgiving

Final plans for the Torrance High Thanksgiving Day football game at Fallbrook have been completed, according to Tartar Coach Eddie Cole.

The entire squad will make the trip, said Cole, leaving here at 7 a.m., Thursday by bus. Kickoff is at 2:30 p.m. Cole hopes to use as many players as possible.

The Fallbrook gridders, coached by Fred Stone, former star at the University of Colorado, won the championship of the Southern league of the C.I.P. this season by sweeping through a seven-game schedule undefeated.

This Saturday, the Fallbrook squad will be in the C.I.F. small school playoffs at Laguna Beach and should be in top shape for the "Turkey Bowl" game. This is the second championship for the squad in Stone's three-year stay at the school, the squad having finished second last year.

Leading the host squad in their single and double wing formations is Ralph Crawford, 185-pound halfback who was chosen all-league for the second successive year. A left-handed passer, Crawford is as skillful a runner as he is at the aerial game.

Despite the fact that the Tartars are meeting a league champ, Cole is confident that the local lads will not be swamped a one-sided score. He pointed out that there was quite a difference in the type of competition in the two leagues and also the southern school is much smaller than Torrance.

'Tarbabes' Roll Over Leuzinger In 33-0 Victory

Unleashing a lightning-like passing and running attack, the Torrance B gridders licked the Leuzinger drough to romp to a 33-0 victory over the B squad from Leuzinger Thursday at the Torrance field.

"Tarbabe" Right End Dave Doherty started the scoring parade in the second quarter when he took a 30-yard pass from the Leuzinger 12-yard stripe and crossed the goal line un molested. Crawford kicked the first of his three successful placements for the afternoon.

Crawford scored twice in the second period and once in the third to run his individual efforts for the game to 21 points. His first tally came on an off-tackle smash from the five after Bob Shuffer, second string left half, had set up the score with a 26-yard jaunt. The conversion attempt was blocked.

Crawford's next scoring journey was on a 45-yard end run after Doherty had recovered a fumbled punt on the Leuzinger 45. Crawford's kick was good.

Crawford was also responsible for the start of the scoring in the second half with a 53-yard gallop over tackle for another "Tarbabe" TD. His try for the extra point was good.

The fifth and final score also came in the third quarter and was again the result of a Leuzinger fumble which Right Half Ralph Standridge recovered on the visitor's 41. On the next play, Snuffer broke away from several tacklers in an off-tackle smash and covered all 41 yards for his contribution to the Tartar parade.

The Torrance line, sparked by the play of Don Bodner and Charlie Bogue at the guards and Tackle Yovan Popovich, held the Leuzinger B's to a net gain of 85 yards for the afternoon while the home team was rolling up a total of 275, although making only nine first downs to Leuzinger's five.

The return of Fullback Dick Cloward to the game for the first time since the season opener was one of the factors involved in the Torrance victory. Although not making any of his team's tallies, Cloward rolled up an average of 65 yards per carry, totaling 65 yards in 10 tries. Cloward saw limited action against Beverly Hills in the previous game and this was his first full session since dislocating his elbow against Redondo seven weeks ago.

Today, the "Tarbabes" play the season finale as they take on the B's from El Segundo at El Segundo. The hosts are presently occupying the cellar of the B standings in the Bay League, having lost all their games so far.


