ADVISORY GROUP TOLD OF MUSIC IN SCHOOLS

Director of Music for Torrance City schools Abe Milstein told Torrance Educational Advisory Council members at their last week's meeting that an extensive program is under way for developing a life-long appreciation for music among school children of this area.

Love of good music has outstanding advantages for a child, he pointed out, in that it develops skills and natural talent, gives the child an opportunity for expression and avoids the trend toward juvenile delinquency which often lures the unoccupied child.

He said participation in a band or orchestra not only elevates the child mentally, but eliminates pitfalls in the way of a youngster who has nothing to do with his time. Better citizens are built this way, he emphasized.

Since understanding is necessary for full enjoyment, activities in elementary and junior high school grades are stressed which will teach children the background and "language" of music, Milstein reported.

He said that although the Los Angeles school district last year provided no money for instrumental instruction, this year Torrance has made rapid headway in a 3-point program of listening activities, participation in musical groups and teaching of musical skills.

Every child in elementary schools now takes part in 20 minutes a day of singing or musical instruction of some sort, he told the group. Among special activities in the junior high school in classical music, which is taught twice a week. If children are first exposed to small "doses," then progressively taught to understand them, by the time they reach high school they will be able to listen to and appreciate all the great classics, Milstein explained.

Various vocal groups, a band meeting twice a week and an orchestra meeting three times a week now occupy students interested in music at the high school, he said.

One of the special projects this year was a musical aptitude test which was given to younger students by the music department. Parents of students who scored high on these tests have been sent letters telling

UNITED NATIONS OBSERVER SPEAKS IN SAN PEDRO

Miss Ann Guthery, world traveler for the YWCA and at present observer at the United Nations in Lake Success, will speak at the San Pedro YWCA on Thursday, Dec. 4.

Miss Guthery, YWCA worker in South America, in the Philippines and in India during the war, was the first civilian woman to return to the Philippines at their request at the close of the war. She heard the pact of surrender in the Pacific as her plane circled over Manila on Sept. 2, 1945.

Believing that the YWCA with its world-wide affiliations can contribute much to humanizing the United Nations, Miss Guthery has proved to be a most dynamic and popular speaker. She will highlight the annual World Fellowship YWCA meeting, of which Mrs. Otto Kresse is the Torrance chairman.

LOVELADY TO TALK ON SPIRITUAL SIDE OF MARRIAGE
