Retail Clerks Strike Picture Clearing Here

man negotiating committee of the San Pedro Business Men's Association, the entire harbor area is united in the presentation of a new contract proposal between the retail stores and the Retail Clerks Union.

This proposed contract between the stores and the union is to take effect on Feb. 1, 1948, as the union has been notified by the stores of their desire to terminate the old contract on its expiration as of Jan. 30th next year.

It is understood that a large percentage of all the stores in the harbor area form this group through the San Pedro Business Men's Association. This will mean the opening of the closed stores in this area as when the contract is signed.

Meanwhile, a lawsuit seeking \$150,000 in damages has been filed in U. S. District Court by the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company against the A. F. of L. Meat Cutters' Local No. 421 and its international, and the Torrance A. & P. meat unit remains closed.

It is believed to be the first action of its kind filed under provisions of the Taft-Hartley Act by a retailer in the United States.

The damage suit seeks to make the union pay for losses suffered in a strike that closed 11 A&P meat departments in Los Angeles Nov. 2.

Although three locals, No. 551 of the Long Beach-Laguna area, No. 49 of the Pasadena to San Bernardino area, and 587 in Santa Monica, have closed 17 additional A&P meat departments, no damage suit has been filed against them yet.

However, charges have been registered against them, their international, and the Western Federation of Butchers of California, with the National Labor Relations Board. The NLRB recently charged the Los Angeles local with violating the Taft-Hartley Act provision that outlaws the closed shop and secondary boycott in contracts with interstate commerce firms. That case will be heard by the NLRB on Jan. 5.

"It is with the greatest reluctance that we file this action against a union with which we have worked for seven years, but the arbitrary and illegal behavior of the union in its efforts to force us to sign a contract which would violate the federal law leaves us no choice," an A&P spokesman said.

"The union has demanded that we sign a contract calling for a closed shop agreement. The Taft-Hartley Act, which is now the law of the land, expressly forbids this stipulation. The general counsel for the National Labor Relations Board has advised us that all contracts signed by us must be

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
