## FIRST 'SOCIAL EVENING' FOR STUDENTS SATURDAY

Beginning a series of regular Saturday night entertainment programs for the young folk of the community, a "social night" will be held from 7:30 to 11 o'clock Saturday night, Dec. 27 in Torrance High School gymnasium.

Sponsored by the Torrance YMCA, YWCA, High School P. T. A. and faculty, the social nights will be open at no admission fee to Torrance High School and Junior High School students upon presentation of their student activity cards.

To insure enjoyable and well-conducted evenings, guests must be registered in the high school counselor's office and issued permits.

"We're trying to provide pleasant Saturday night entertainment for Torrance boys and girls," Miss Harriet Hardy, high school dean of girls commented, "since at the present time they have absolutely no place to go when it's time for social fun, except the movies or the pool halls."

Almost every form of entertainment will be offered at the gymnasium, with dancing, ping pong, games and refreshments as regular attractions. Each week a special feature will be on the program with the first scheduled for Saturday as motion pictures to be shown by YMCA Director Milton Isbell.

A student committee, headed by Gene Stirling, assisted by Jack and Dick Turner and Marilyn Bylesby and the High School P. T. A. will sell at no profit, refreshments of hot dogs, cakes, doughnuts and 5 and 10-cent candy bars in a "pantry" to be set up in the gymnasium.

Games of checkers, bridge, rummy and carom will be played, with Bob Walters and Beverly Crook in charge of the game room. Ping pong will be under the supervision of Bill Morgan and Nancy Whyte.

Another attraction will be a room for relaxation where students can sit and talk between dances and games, Miss Hardy said.

Girls will wear informal sports clothes or dress slacks, but no levis will be allowed. Boys can wear any type of clean, informal sports attire.



## RAIDING OF COLORADO WATER SEEN IN BILL

Endless raiding of the water rights of operating and authorized projects would follow the granting of Arizona's claim to additional water from the Colorado River, according to Ben P. Griffith, secretary of the Colorado River Association. "One of the dangerous by-products of Arizona's attempt to push through Congress the bill authorizing the expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000,000 for the construction of the so-called Central Arizona Irrigation Project is that it would open the door to similar attempts all along the line," said Griffith. "It would not be long before such things as established rights and solemn contracts would be as worthless as the paper on which they are recorded."

It is this danger which is one of the considerations prompting the association to press for Supreme Court adjudication of the Arizona-California water controversy, Griffith pointed out.

"Once the Supreme Court has made a decision the issue will be settled," he asserted. "This is the only legitimate solution. To carry the controversy thru the Congress, as Arizona desires, would be to make a political football of Southern California's long-established water rights in the Colorado River. Such a situation is unthinkable."

During the closing days of the last session of Congress, he explained, resolutions referring the dispute to the Supreme Court were introduced in the House and Senate. This move was made necessary because Congress is required to vote assent to a Supreme Court suit whenever, as in this case, the

United States is a necessary party.

"Adjudication by the Supreme Court was sought only after all other attempts at finding a solution had failed," declared Griffith. "Governor Osborn, of Arizona, has steadfastly refused either negotiation, arbitration, or litigation. He has spurned all such offers made to him by Governors Warren, of California, and Pittman, of Nevada."

"It is deplorable when sister states such as Arizona and California cannot arrive at an amicable settlement of an interstate dispute. Such, however, is true in this case."

## RAPID PROGRESS BEING MADE ON NATIVITY SCHOOL

Rapid progress is being made on the new Nativity church school at Acacia avenue and Carson street, and plans are being prepared for the sisters' home to house the teachers of the institution which will start operating next year.

The home for the faculty members will be designed to accommodate nine teachers, but financing of the project is not yet completed, according to the Rev. Father P. J. McGuinness.

## LOMITA WEIGHT LIMIT ORDINANCE TO BE EXTENDED

An amendment to a traffic ordinance regulating weight limits over highways in Lomita now includes Walnut street from Ebony lane to Lomita boulevard, the county counsel has reported.

The Los Angeles Board of Supervisors was scheduled to consider the change at the Tuesday, Dec. 23 meeting.
