For one of Coach's boys the Narbonne game will have added significance. He is Wade Fisk, who played first string Bee forward for Narbonne last year. Graybehl will use him at forward against the Gauchos.

Other boys who are suited up include Gregg James, Larry Fischer, Glenn Mitchell, Charles Vorhis, Ralph Standridge and Pete Douroux.

Final Figures on Post-season Tilt Still Incomplete

Student tickets and adult tickets sold at the gate for the Torrance-Bell Gardens game, netted the Student Body fund at Torrance High School \$64.50 toward the purchase of an electric scoreboard, according to figures released yesterday by C. E. Wallace, vice-principal.

Frank Dominguez, chairman of the advance ticket sales committee of the newly organized Torrance Athletic Club, reported that the returns from those who were selling tickets were not completed and that no figures are available at the present time.

All expenses for the post-season game were deducted from the sales made at the high school and at the gate. These expenses amounted to \$399.50 which included \$50 for officials, \$200 to Bell Gardens as their share of the gate, \$75 field rental, and \$20 for bus driver wages. Federal tax payments will be made from the money raised by the advanced sale, Wallace said.
