School Plans Are Approved

(Continued from Page 1-A) would amount to more than \$1,000 per pupil.

The Torrance Elementary cafeteria probably will be built at the end of the present auditorium building, and cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000, Daniel said.

At the Fern Avenue School it is proposed to add a separate "cafetorium" unit facing on Sonoma avenue, approximately 60 by 34 feet in area, which would seat 300 children and include a separate dining room for the teachers. Estimated cost is between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

The high school cafeteria would be the largest of the three now planned, and would seat 350 students, with two serving lines and provision for the lines to form outside or inside the building. Estimated cost is \$130,000.

Details of the proposed administration building and service unit as explained by the architects show provision for a board meeting room, office of the superintendent, business manager's office, reception room for visitors, a lounge room for women employees, a large concrete vault, auditing section, large book storage room, a textbook library, book repair shop and mimeograph room.

The architects also had selected a location for a large bus garage near this proposed building, and another quonset building.


