Educator Brings Message to Fern Avenue PTA Group

Fern Avenue P.T.A. held its January meeting last Wednesday with Mrs. Grace Nolan, Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools office, as the principal speaker. Through her experiences with children Mrs. Nolan has worked out the following rules for bringing about better adjustments through parent guidance:

Never destroy his sense of security. Let him know you love him. Teach him that this is an orderly universe—that all are equal. Never let him feel that his is the stronger personality. Never break a promise. Don't let him become over-stimulated with comic books, radio programs and shows of the wrong type. Don't tie him to your apron strings. Don't surround with over-anxiety. Be the kind of person you want him to be. Expect the child to do the right thing, and he will. No violent displays of emotion or temper in his presence. She stressed the fact that in each classroom pupils of the same chronological age might differ greatly in mental ability and should be treated individually.

A graduate theatrical architect, he designed the sets, which were constructed and erected under his close supervision. It is also under Mr. Bryden's direction that a new, lively, up-to-the-moment interpretation of Ibsen's great classic was prepared by Literary Editor George Barton for stage presentation.
