STUDENT ORCHESTRA NAMES NEW DIRECTOR

Fred H. Graichen, supervisor of instrumental music for the Los Angeles City junior and senior high schools, was appointed director of the All-Harbor Orchestra at a meeting held at Narbonne High School last week.
