stucco walls and the roof structure supported by steel pipes.

Temporary, or moveable buildings he said he regarded as "not impossible to build but impractical." He said that cost of the buildings now planned for the Seaside Ranchos, Walteria and North Torrance areas would leave no funds for temporary buildings.

Answering a question on architect's fees, he said the straight fee was eight per cent, plus about four per cent for incidentals, such as change orders, cost of state inspection, surveys and soil tests on the building site.

Supt. J. H. Hull telephoned from San Francisco Monday following a conference with Dr. C. C. Ellmwood regarding a site for the Hollywood Riviera school and remarked that "good" progress was being made.

As to transportation of children from Hollywood Riviera across the state highway (101) Ingram said regular school buses would be used in shuttle service, and would be no problem.

Mrs. Paul Roetger asked how long it would be before the voters would be asked to vote more bonds for schools.

"That is a \$64 question, but when a city like Torrance, with 19 square miles, grows like it has during 1948, the demand for schools must be expected to increase in proportion, and there's nothing we can do about it. North Torrance will grow just as fast as Hollywood Riviera when it gets started.

Torrance is such a nice place in which to live," Ingram added. "It would appear that present funds might be used up by the end of the year."

Capacity of Seaside Ranchos schools will be 540 children—30 pupils for each of the 16 regular classrooms, with kindergarten on double sessions—but this could be expanded, he said. Also, personnel—teachers—will be available, he said, in answer to a question.

Of the present school budget, he said, 68 per cent was for

teachers' salaries, 10 per cent was for transportation costs, 4 1/2 per cent for administration.

The Hollywood Riviera site, if acquired, could be used for a community playground, he believes, until the school is built.

Mrs. H. G. Miller, chairman of the Association's school committee, told Ingram at conclusion of the meeting:

"You've reassured us, Mr. Ingram, and we understand the situation much better because you were here personally to answer our questions."

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

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
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
