

### First Symphony Concert Of Season This Evening

Elyse Aehle will raise her baton this evening at eight o'clock to direct the South Bay Civic Symphony Orchestra at Redondo Beach Union High School in the first concert of the season.

The orchestra, now in its third year, comprising 85 talented musicians from the South Bay and surrounding area, never has been better coordinated and ready for public appearance than it is now, Miss Aehle states, and she lauds their diligence in preparing for the concert which will be given free to the public.

Appearing with the orchestra for the first time as guest soloist will be John Gillespie, brilliant young pianist.

Opening the evening program will be the presentation of the Haydn's Second Symphony by the entire orchestra and following will be the Tschakowsky Ballet Suite from Lac des Cygnes.

Guest soloist John Gillespie will play two brilliant numbers, Bach's "Italian Concerto" (Last Movement) and Brahms' "Rhapsody No. 2."

The orchestra will return to the stage for the rendition of Weber's "Der Freischutz Overture," Sibelius' "Valse Triste," and Wagner's March from "Tannhauser."
