## Pirate-Tartar Meet Likely to be Lopsided

Torrance High's leather-junglers travel to San Pedro tomorrow afternoon to resume their track-wars with the Pirates. The host school probably will crush the locals in the varsity division, however, the Tartar Bee and Cee cindermen are favorites.

Nick Apple and Sam Jackson are tops in distance races for the Pirates while Alex Freacely and Jim Decker boast excellent times in the hurdles and sprints respectively.

John Santschi, coach of the Pedro incls, has an excellent broad jumper, Don Shaw, who leaps over 21 feet.

The only event in which the Marine League outfit is weak is the pole vault.

Last week the local varsity salvaged their lone victory in the pole vault when Chuck Henry went over the bar at 9-feet, 6-inches.

Saint Anthony trampled the Tartar varsity, 85-16, in a take-away on the soggy Saint stadium oval Friday afternoon.

Faced by Russell Hern, who snatched the high and low hurdles and the high jump, the Long Beach squad looked sharp in every event.

Barefoot miler Martin Hicks snapped the Saint mile record with a new mark of 5:03.9.

Turning the tables in the lower division of the meet, the Torrance Bees and Cees romped over the St. Anthony middles with 71-25 and 75 1/2-1 1/2 respectively.

Harold Brugger paced the Tarabes with wins in both the 100-yard dash and the 120-low sticks. The Torrance boys made clean sweeps in the low hurdles and 660.

Other individual winners were Wayne Scholl in the high hurdles, John Kulp in the 1200, Dave Baker in the 220, Boyd Crawford in the pole vault, Wade Fisk in the high jump, and George Whiting in the 660.

Fran Munsterman and Bob Fersenius played a terrific contest for the winners and chalked up 17 and 15 digits respectively. Phil Campbell led the losers with nine markers.

After taking a close 8-6 advantage going into the second quarter, the Nats lost their accuracy and slipped to the short end of a 20-17 count at the intermission.

Following halftime, the Whittier squad widened their margin and were out in front, 32-26, going into the final period. ## 'Herald' Gets Newest Type Phone System

The Torrancia Herald this week is using a new type of improved office telephone service—the first of its kind installed for a Southern California newspaper—in its new plant at 1619 Gramercy avenue.

Recently developed by the Bell Telephone Laboratories, the improved type of service is made up of telephone instruments with clear plastic pushbuttons. These pushbuttons illuminate to show the telephone lines used by personnel either sending or receiving calls.

The new instruments and complex telephone wiring offer a compact system, especially adapted to the Herald's needs, that is complete with line lights and busy lights. The newspaper uses four telephone lines and nine telephones where all or some of the lines may be picked up.


