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

Rapid Transit Discussed on Editor's TV Show

"Place employment nearer the worker and you will solve the traffic congestion problem."

Thus Charles T. Rippy, past president of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, spoke his opinion to the question "Should We Establish a Los Angeles County Rapid Transit District?" on the television program "Editor's Round Table" last Sunday evening at 8 p.m. over station KNBH.

Rippy and Mayor E. S. Dixon of Inglewood, who took the negative side of the question, well qualified their opposition of the affirmative side, which was taken by Neil Peterson, chairman of the Los Angeles Citizen's Traffic and Transit committee.

Rippy pointed out that downtown Los Angeles business has been decentralizing for the past 30 years, and instead of attempting to move more people into this highly congested area city officials should consider the decentralization of industry as a means of solving the problem.

Rippy added that the large department stores, by building stores in the outlying districts of Los Angeles, were an example of what business could do to solve the traffic congestion problem by bringing the employment nearer to the worker.

Rippy and Dixon argued that it would not be fair for the surrounding communities of Los Angeles to bare the tax burden of a county rapid transit district.

Virgil Pintley, publisher of the Los Angeles Mirror, acted as moderator.
