## El Camino Calls For Stadium Seating Bids

Permanent stadium seating for slightly in excess of 5100 people was assured last week by action of the Board of Trustees of El Camino College in authorizing the call for bids for immediate construction. Plans prepared by Harold A.

Barnett, Civil Engineer, presented to the Board for their approval called for the installation of five sections of seats; three on the west side of the stadium and two on the east side and also the construction of a players tunnel 90 feet in length connecting the playing fields with the new Field House now under construction. It is expected that the new permanent seating will be installed and ready for use this fall. The stadium will have an ultimate seating capacity of slightly in excess of 20,000 persons.

The Trustees also accepted a recommendation from Landscape Architect, Ralph D. Cornell, for the planting of Italian stone pines along the perimeter of the campus and authorized Business Manager Carl G. Arfwedson to purchase the trees and have them planted as soon as possible. Planting of trees on the campus will be withheld until more of the permanent buildings have been constructed.

In other actions of the Board approval was given for working drawings on the Student Union and Cafeteria Buildings as presented by Howard Morgridge of the architectural firm of March, Smith and Powell, Los Angeles. The new cafeteria will have a seating capacity of 886 students and construction is expected to be commenced early in the fall. Estimated cost for this addition is \$325,000. Morgridge also presented to the Board preliminary plans calling for the construction of an Administration and Classroom Unit to be erected on the Greenway boulevard frontage; construction is scheduled to begin in the early fall of this year.

President Forrest G. Murdock reported to the Board relative to recent trips to Sacramento concerning legislative matters pending before the State Legislature. Murdock was authorized to attend the sessions of the California Secondary School Principals' Conference in San Diego April 11 and 13. President Murdock is scheduled to appear as leader in the conference in the section meetings

Don Young is scheduled to open on the mound for the Tartar opponents while Harry Theodosis will handle the pitching chores of the locals. The return of Max Robinson to the Torrance squad will fill in an important gap in right field. Although the home town gang has been rusty throughout the past week due to no practice affairs, they are ready and willing to overcome their enemies.

Pitchers: "The pitching staff runs hot and cold. Harry 'The Cat' Theodosis can be good—in fact the best if he can find a horseshoe, to change his luck. Dave Bishop is working hard and improving with every start. Mill Long comes in from the outfield to fill out the trio."

Catchers: "The department is well stocked with Jim Taylor receiving the starting nod. Buddy Licht is right behind Taylor but his greater speed makes him more valuable in the outfield positions."

First base: "Dick Turner has a strangle hold on the spot, not because of a lack of competition, but because of his vital size."

Second base: "Wendell Vaughn will force 'Mumps' Mitchell to go above last season's form to oust him."

Third base: "Gregg James sits in pretty solid in the hot corner."

Shortstop: "Bob Chambers is using his experience to keep down the rookies. Bill Crawford, with a little more seasoning, will be a great infielder."

Outfield: "Paul Smith still trots out to left field but unless he can get the moonbeams out of his eyes and hit the ball a little harder, he will have to dream on the bench. 'Chucker' Long fills in at center and Licht will manage right field. A club's power at the plate supposedly is furnished by the outfield but about all the Tartar fly chasers have added has been scenery."

## THINCLADS TO COMPETE IN EL MONTE RELAYS

Tomorrow afternoon the local prep cindermen embark on a voyage to compete in the sixth annual El Monte Relays at the host oval. The relays, probably the only relays in the United States run off in that manner even right through the field events, will attract over 800 of the Southland's finest thinclads from over 20 schools entered.

Last year the Tartars placed eighth in the overall scoring and the Bees came within two points of capturing the championship. Torrance holds the Bee shutout record.

Although the locals probably won't fare so well this year, they are expected to garner a few tallies in the Bee and Cee divisions. There are no Tartar varsity entries. Altogether, the home town boys are scheduled to compete in six events.

Tuesday afternoon, Frank Schmidt heaved the shot 49 feet, 9 inches to set a new school Cee record as the local Ceebeats downed Jordan 44-32 on the Panther track. However, the host school proved to be impolite as they slaughtered the Torrance varsity and Bee squads, 78-18 and 59-23, respectively.

Schmidt's terrific toss cracked the old standard set by Jim Webb in 1947 of 49 feet, 6 inches. Pete Douroux, the flying Frenchman, sprinted in the last 220 yards as he captured the varsity 880 with a sensational 2:07 clocking.

John Schultz hit the win column for the second successive week as he showed the varsity shot 46 feet, 10 inches.

John Kulp turned in the most outstanding running performance in the Bee division as he toured the 1320 in 3:27. Lefty Scholl zoomed to a victory in the high hurdles while Wade Fisk and Boyd Crawford, both soared to the highest mark of their careers in topping 11 feet, 3 inches in the pole vault. Fisk also tied for first place in the high jump. A clean sweep in the 660, shot put, and high jump featured the Cee win.

Larry Downing, Jack O' Cain, Frank Kelly, Aramis Dandoy, Frank Schmidt, and Norm Stock all succeeded in taking their respective events. Stock's sensational 14.6 timing in the low hurdles lacked two-tenths of a second of equalling last year's mark in the league finals.
