Use Herbs to Add Zest to Soup, Salads

You've missed something if you haven't tried a bit of herb in soups and salads that you serve. Herbs are especially good in soups are parsley, bay leaves, peppercorns, basil, garlic, and others. For soup in a hurry plan to keep a supply of meat stock base on hand in your refrigerator. To make it, cover a good sized soup bone with cold water, add a small onion, carrot, and a handful of celery leaves. Add a bit of parsley, one or two bay leaves, eight or ten peppercorns, and salt. Heat to boiling, then simmer from three hours. Strain, cool in an uncovered pan, then lift off the layer of hard fat that forms. Store the solution to use as a plain broth or as a foundation for vegetable soup, onion, minestrone, or others. You may want to plant a few herbs this spring to use fresh. Usually one plant will be suffi-
