

Ten Boy Scout Troops to Take Part in Circus

Sometime between now and May 7, a young man, dressed in the uniform of a Boy Scout, will ring your door-bell and ask you to purchase a ticket to the most unique show of its kind ever to appear in the Los Angeles area. The show is the fabulous Boy Scout Circus, presented by the Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts and Senior Scouts of the Los Angeles Area Council. It is a regular circus, only the performers are Scouts rather than professional entertainers. Every phase of the Scouting program will be displayed, cleverly interwoven with thrilling spectacles, feats of skill, pagantry, games and contests. The audience will be serenaded by the famous Los Angeles Police Band, while more than 15,000 Scouts will march onto the field led by their Troop colors in the grand entry. More than 5,000 Cub Scouts will present a land of make-believe with huge animals and story book characters. There will be demonstrations of first aid, camp cooking, fire building, signalling, land and sea rescue methods, and innumerable other Scouting skills.

The great field of Gilmore Stadium will be covered with tents of every description, and the mighty outline of California will flare up in the flames of hundreds of camp fires. The important phase of Scouting, physical development, will be displayed by scores of Scouts engaged in tumbling, boxing, wrestling and other thrilling sports.

The climax of the show will be the gigantic investiture ceremony where every Scout joining the movement within the last year will be formally pledged to the Scout oath and law to live up to the high ideals of Scouting. The show will end with a grand finale and a surprise spectacle.

Every troop in the Torrance area is planning to take part in some phase of this great circus. Cub Pack 241-C, under the leadership of Cubmaster Luke Nickel, will participate in the huge land of make-believe spectacle. The boys will appear as characters of fairy tales, Mother Goose etc. Scout Troop 241 will have a prominent part in physical development display. The boys have developed a tumbling act under the leadership of Mr. Frank Williams former member of the tumbling and wrestling teams of the University of Indiana.

Cub Pack 721-C will participate in the thrilling pageant, Carnival Capers. The Cubs will be costumed in the gay finery of the Mardi Gras and the act will come to a climax with the releasing of hundreds of gaily colored balloons. Troops 216, 219 and 721 are all planning to take part in the grand entry, the investiture ceremony and the grand finale.

All ticket sales to this great show are being handled by the Scouts themselves. Each boy selling \$10 worth of tickets will receive a colorful plastic neckerchief slide featuring the famous Boy Scout Clown. There will be two performances, Friday evening, May 6 and Saturday evening, May 7. The tickets range in price from fifty cents for general admission, to one dollar for reserved seats. Ten percent of the ticket sales will be returned to the individual Troops. When that Scout knocks on your door, don't turn him away. This is a show you can't afford to miss!

The Cub Scouts of pack 241-C held a giant do-nut sale recently, to raise money for transportation to the Scout Circus, where they are planning to take part in the program. The do-nuts were sold door to door and the sale was an unequalled success. The boys sold 400 dozen do-nuts at fifty cents a dozen, earning ample money for the rental of a bus for the evening, 721-C.

Cub pack 721-C held a skating party, at the Redondo Roller Rink. All boys in the pack were present at this social event, and a fine time was had by all.

Scout Troop 219 presented a fine demonstration of aluminum foil cooking at a recent regular troop meeting. Each boy was instructed to bring an apple and a potato to be cooked by this novel and unique method. The food was wrapped in the aluminum foil and placed directly on the coals of the fire. The results obtained by this method of camp cooking are wonderful, and some troops have successfully camped with no cooking utensil of any sort, relying completely on the foil. This is an excellent method for all campers and hunters, according to Scoutmaster Ralph Allen.

GREATER COMMUNITY CHEST AID PROMISED

Greater and more direct representation for the citizens of Torrance, Lomita and the 64 other towns and cities in the Community Chest area will result from plans now underway to enlarge the present board of the Welfare Federation of Los Angeles area from 27 to 270 members.

This announcement was made by Paul E. Yost, president of the Federation which is the controlling body of the Community Chest. At the next Federation election which will take place in May in conjunction with the Silver Anniversary of the Chest, the enlarged board will take office, Yost said.

In the meantime, a group of 6000 "Welfare Associates" comprising of community leaders and members of business, labor, religious, club, professional and

other groups throughout the entire Chest area are aiding in the selection of nominees for board membership. There are 49 such "Associates" from Torrance and 10 from Lomita, taking part in this project.

"We are getting enthusiastic response from citizens everywhere in this plan to enlarge the Federation's board of directors," Yost said. "It will be invaluable in planning to meet the needs and wishes of the great population of the Los Angeles metropolitan area."

The over-all voting membership of the Federation which will elect the board is comprised of 543,000 Community Chest contributors, the 6,000 Welfare Associates and the participating Red Feather health welfare and youth organizations. Nominating committee includes Frank N. Rush, chairman, Bryant Essick, Judge Thomas P. White, Walter S. Hilborn, James E. Sheldon and Mrs. Maynard Toll.

Yost also announced that plans for next year's Chest campaign are progressing with the appointment of George J. O'Brien, vice-president of the Standard Oil Co. of California as over-all chairman.

A veteran of 22 previous campaigns, O'Brien is identified with many civic and business groups locally and is a member of the board of directors of the All Year Club of Southern California, California Bank, Downtown Business Men's Assn., and Greater Los Angeles Plans Inc.

With the increased public awareness of what Chest agencies do and what their needs are, which grew out of the short term emergency appeal in January, O'Brien is confident that a successful volunteer organization can be built for the campaign next fall.
