

Electrician Alive but Burned After Touching 66,000 Volts

Though burned severely Gilbert Whitacre, 39, an electrician living at the Eureka Hotel narrowly escaped electrocution last week in Hanford, California when he accidentally brushed against a line carrying 66,000 volts.

Whitacre, an employee of the Southern California Edison Company, had been temporarily assigned to the northern city to help install a transformer station when the accident occurred.

Company officials said he received second and third degree burns about his chest, arms and face and underwent surgical treatment at the Kings General Hospital. His shirt was completely burned off.

Whitacre lives at the Eureka Hotel on Abalone street with his wife, Lee, and his two children, Maralyn, a daughter, and John, his five-year-old son.

The victim is the brother of Gale Whitacre, police officer; Harlan Whitacre, fireman; and Paul Whitacre, a foundryman.


