

Coach Eddie Cole took his crystal ball to spring grid workouts last week gazed into the future of the squad for next season, and drew a blank.

A blank check from where we sit! Here's the old song-and-dance that "Curley" Cole and Line Mentor Rex Welch were singing this week:

"We Ain't got No Body." This of course, referring to such grid-iron mainstays of last year as Dick Turner and Milo "Goat Legs" Goettsch, co-captains, also Jack Webb, and Buddy Light—all backfield starters.

Welch is singing a solo that starts with "Gone Are the Days"—when I had such linemen as Dick Oefinger, Onal Harris, Tony Donatoni, Don Bodner, John Schultz, Ray Maddock, Bill Dominguez, and Jim Webb."

"Hey Coach, remember last year when you started singing that same tune and then popped up with a better than average squad. Remember how difficult it was when you tried to whistle out of the other side of your mouth when you had your tongue in your cheek. Lay off the "Hearts and Flowers" you two! Music ain't your line.
