Sea Scout Ship 213-S is a ship without a port! Lacking sponsorship the local unit is facing a revocation of its charter.

Once again an attempt is being made to reactivate the ship under the leadership of its new skipper, John P. Wilson.

This unit is composed of ten young men and their leaders who have worked long and hard to get this unit underway again and bring the very worthwhile Sea Scout program to Torrance. This group is operating under a very severe handicap, however, as they do not as yet have a sponsor. These boys have a boat, and have put in long hours refitting it to meet their needs. They have an excellent motor for their boat which has been reconditioned by the Navy at a cost of well over \$1000.

When the get a sponsor, they will get their motor, and not before. As it looks now, all of the fine work that these young men have put in will be of no avail and the Sea Scout program in Torrance will fold up once more because of the lack of interest on the part of the citizens of this community.

Any scout unit, in order to receive its charter, must be backed by some sponsoring institution. This may be a church, school, service club, or even a group of interested citizens. This sponsor must provide a committee to oversee the work of the scout unit and provide the very little financial backing needed to get the program started. The members of 213-S have canvassed almost all the service clubs of Torrance for backing and have received very little encouragement. Some groups are already sponsoring several youth movements, some say that their members simply can not give the time, and others are just plain not interested. These boys must have a sponsor, and soon, or they will lose their boat, their motor, and what is more important, their faith in the generosity and interest of the citizens of Torrance.

The Sea Scout program is an active one, based on a love of the sea, and the many skills, customs and traditions of the seaman. The Sea Scout learns many things, how to navigate, the handling of boats, naval courtesy and rules of the road, and a host of other skills related to seamanship. What is most important, he learns how to live with others—respect their feelings and wishes, and get along in the world as a well rounded individual. These boys of 213-S have displayed all the skills of organization and leadership at their command. Let's not let them down!
