With several vacancies still existing, Police Chief John Stroh, issued an invitation this week to the youth of the community, and especially the girls, to join the Torrance Auxiliary Junior Police.

Application blanks may be obtained from the police station, Stroh declared.

The TAP junior program is sponsored by the Torrance Police Officers' Association with purposes and objectives as follows:

To promote among the youth of the community, through the Auxiliary Junior Police organization, good citizenship, a sense of responsibility to community, cooperation with law enforcement agencies, the development of leadership and encouragement of wholesome leisure time activities.

Girls' activities will be supervised by a police woman and with adult female coordinators, Stroh said.

The TAP junior program is headed by the Chief of Police and is directed by the Torrance Police Officers' Association's "Youth Committee."

Keno-Quiz May Be Ok'd Under New City Ordinance

No Revenue Now for City Under Present Laws

The City Council opened the door last Tuesday night that may lead the way for the granting of a permit to operate a Keno-Skill-Quiz game in Torrance.

The city fathers ordered an ordinance drafted that would grant the VFW Post permission to operate the game. The law would provide that certain revenues would be paid the city by the operators.

Little objection was expressed at the meeting against the game which is said to be a combination of keno and a radio quiz contest.

Representing the American Amusement Company and the local VFW Post was Attorney C. Ransom Santurison. He outlined briefly the game as it would be played. He claimed the game was not a gamble and that if it was not played as represented they would close the game. He offered to bear the expenses of having the game investigated by undercover men hired by Police Chief John Stroh.

Also representing the VFW was Attorney Boris Woolley himself a member of the local post.

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Dump Operators Denied Permit

After a rather heated discussion which had Mayor J. Hugh Sherfy rapping for order, the City Sanitation and Dump Company was denied a permit to operate an oil sump clean-up business on the Standard Oil lease in Southwest Torrance.

According to Lorne D. Middough owner of the firm and the large pit on the Standard lease would be used as a dump for oil sump refuse. When members of the audience scoffed at Middough's remarks that process of recovering oil would produce no obnoxious odors he promptly withdrew his request that he be allowed to reclaim oil from the refuse.

He sought then only permission to haul in rotary mud, sludge, concrete, timbers, and similar debris collected from abandoned oil well sites and dump into the large excavation.

He told the gathering that he considered the project a service to Torrance since that in place of many sumps now existing within the city only one would exist after the abandoned wells were cleaned up. He indicated that the big pit would eventually be covered with dirt and made level.

After hearing several objections from the audience the council voted to deny Middough a permit to operate the dump.

Driver Lucky as Two Girls Hurt

The football career of high school student Jim Taylor probably came to an abrupt end last Saturday night when the 15-year-old youth suffered a broken neck in an auto crash in San Pedro.

Three other Torrance teenage youths were involved in the accident—two receiving injuries.

The injured girls, both of whom were graduated from Torrance High School last Thursday are:

Gloria Chapman, 18, of 1319 Carson street, fractured left ankle.

Lorraine Anderson, 18, of 815 Amapola avenue, rib injuries.

Taylor lives at 2063 West 220th street.

Driver of the coupe in which young Taylor is said to have been riding was listed by San Pedro police as Ernest G. Dandoy, 17, of 2221 West 235th street. He told the officers he apparently dozed for a moment and crashed into a utility pole on Pacific avenue north of 27th street in San Pedro at 1 a.m. Sunday morning.

Taylor, a junior at the local high school and a stellar left end around whom Coach Eddie Cole was building the hopes of next season's varsity football squad, underwent an operation Monday night at the Torrance Memorial Hospital. According to Dr. Clifford E. Easley, who performed the operation with assistance of Dr. Rodney A. Stetson, Taylor will be forced to lie flat on his back for the next six to eight weeks.

Though the grid star has a partial paralysis of both arms, Dr. Easley stated that the condition was temporary and would pass in time.

Ironically, the youth's father, John Taylor, narrowly escaped serious injury when he crashed into a signal standard driving to the hospital to see his son later the same night.

Adding to the irony of the situation, the elder Taylor reported that someone stole a Scottish uniform and bass drum from his wrecked automobile in front of Drake's Drive-in, 1197 Anaheim boulevard, Harbor City—scene of the second crash. Taylor was a member of the Long Beach Scots and the Palos Verdes Pipe Band. He valued the uniform and drum at \$200.

Taylor and Miss Anderson were said to have been riding in the turtleback when the accident occurred. Miss Chapman was a passenger in the front seat.

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Cops Seek Confession

With one yegg killed and his companion in custody in El Segundo, Torrance Police this week believed they have solved the recent burglary of Torrance High School.

Dead is James T. Manley, about 30, of 327 West 162 street, who was dropped by a bullet from the gun of officer Alex Haddock, El Segundo policeman. Officer Haddock said he shot Manley as he discovered the latter leaving the El Segundo High School early Sunday morning.

Manley was found to have \$62 in his possession. The safe door on the high school vault was sprung open.

Detective Captain Ernie Ashton of the Torrance Police Department, investigated the possibility that Manley and his companion, who was apprehended at the time Manley was shot, were the same pair who burglarized the Torrance High School vault two weeks ago. He said the marks on the vault door at the local high school and irregularities and scars on tools found in the El Segundo job matched perfectly.

John Steinbaugh, principal of Torrance High School, still is completing an audit of the books to determine the amount of cash stolen from the local high school. The amount was estimated as being from \$65 upward.

Manley's companion in the crime, said to be his brother-in-law, Arnold Moore, 37, of the 162nd street address, is being

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
